Focus on Gambling

House-Banked Card Rooms Internal Control Changes

House-banked card room licensees are required to submit Internal Controls to their local agent for review and approval. "Handout B" of the Internal Controls packet outlines what must be submitted.



Effective July 1, 2007, "Handout B" was revised to require you to submit additional information to your agent. Following is a brief description of some of the additional information that is required.

More detailed information regarding procedures to ensure:

- Minors do not gamble;
- All card room employees are properly licensed and trained;
- Tips are properly accounted for;

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2007 Legislative Re-Cap

The 2007 legislative session was very busy with nearly 20 gambling-related bills introduced. Four of those bills passed and will become effective July 22, 2007. The Commissioners requested the legislature take action on three bills; these bills are called "Agency Request Legislation." One of those three bills (HB 1218) passed.

2007 was year one of the two year legislative cycle. This means that bills that "died" in 2007 can be considered again during the 2008 legislative session. Following are four gambling related bills that passed:

Licensing (Agency Request Legislation - HB 1218)

- Allows the Director to issue temporary licenses to individual licensees (card room employees, etc.) and other businesses (manufacturers, distributors, amusement game operators, etc.).

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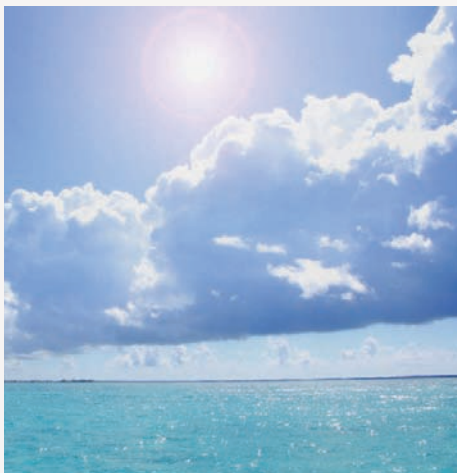
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Recreational Gaming Activities New On-line Notification

We are very close to launching our Fund Raising Event Equipment Distributor (FRE Equipment Distributor) on-line Recreational Gaming Activity (RGA) notification program. We have been developing this program for several months.

What we plan to accomplish with the new on-line program is to allow FRE Equipment Distributors to list the name of the organization hosting the RGA, the date, time, and location of each RGA that they book. They will be asked to put the information into our on-line format via our agency website (www.wsgc.wa.gov/online services). We hope this will be a tool that FRE Equipment Distributors will use to see if organizations hosting RGAs have held two in a calendar year already (organizations may only host two RGAs each year).

WAC 230-02-505 requires FRE Equipment Distributors to send us a list of RGAs they plan to host. We enter that information into a computer database. The new on-line process will save staff time by no longer entering the information submitted by each FRE Equipment Distributor. The information will go directly into a database system as it is entered onto our website by FRE Equipment Distributors.

I would like to thank Dan Blagnovich, of West Coast Cruises, for volunteering to help us in the development phase of the program. His organization was very helpful in giving us input on what would be meaningful information to FRE Equipment Distributors, and what would make the site easier to understand and navigate for the users.

Reporting Gambling Activity

At the June 2005 Commission meeting, Quarterly Activity Reporting was discussed. The Commissioners recognized some licensees were repeat late filers, there were charges pending against some licensees for filing their reports late, and that rules regarding reporting were changing. They asked staff to make sure licensees were notified of the rules for turning in their reports on time and what the consequences would be for not complying.

As a result of that meeting, Quarterly Activity Reports were simplified. For example, the number of fields was reduced by two thirds (36 fields to 11) and the number of lines was reduced by more than half (17 lines to 7) for commercial pull-tab activity reports. Additionally, we began an outreach plan and stricter enforcement. This plan took effect during the reporting period of 3rd and 4th quarters of 2005; reports were due January 30, 2006. Final enforcement action was taken in February 2006.

If a licensee submits a report late and they have submitted:

- All reports on time during the last eight quarters, they will receive a Warning Letter
- Two or three reports late during the last eight quarters, they will receive a Notice of Violation and Settlement (NOVAS), with a \$300 or \$500 fine, respectively.
- Four or more reports late during the last eight quarters, they will receive a statement of charges (charges) to revoke their license.

Lessons learned during that time-period included the need for more education of licensees, agents, and employees regarding enforcement actions that would be taken for late reporting. As a result of these lessons learned, a multi-divisional team was formed and it structured a plan that included additional education and outreach to licensees and agency staff. This included:

- Publishing an article in the Focus on Gambling Newsletter, April- June 2006 Edition. A similar article is also posted at the bottom of our website's homepage.
- Mailing out inserts with Activity Reports to licensees describing enforcement actions.
- Receiving feedback from field agents. Agents requested more information about licensees requiring action prior to the reporting deadline, so agents could take a proactive approach in helping licensees comply with deadlines.

When the new enforcement action was first implemented, there was a significant increase in the number of charges and NOVAS issued (31 charges and 35 NOVAS). During the latest reporting cycle the number of charges issued was down, but the number of NOVAS issued remained relatively high (8 charges and 33 NOVAS).

We will be evaluating the ongoing effectiveness of the program again next year.

- Gambling cards and chips are properly accounted for; and
- Each card room department's duties are clear. For example, instead of just listing each required item in the administration section (organization chart, job descriptions, hours of operation, etc.), specific information will be required for each item in each section.

Beginning July 1, 2007, agents will start visiting their assigned card rooms to deliver and explain the revised "Handout B". You will be asked to revise your Internal Controls and submit them to your agent no later than August 31, 2007.

We anticipate agents will complete the review and approval of the revised Internal Controls by September 30, 2007. If you have any questions, please contact your agent.

Card Games - Petition for Rule Change

WAC 230-40-010

Shuffle Master, a licensed manufacturer, is requesting that the limit on the number of games that can be played within a single hand of cards be increased from two to three.

Card Games - Petition for Rule Change

WAC 230-40-800

A licensed card room employee is requesting the ability to deal Pai Gow games by hand, rather than from a shoe.

Pull-Tabs – Petition for Rule Change

WAC 230-30-080

The Washington Charitable and Civic Gaming Association is requesting that pull-tab payouts be increased from \$750 to \$2,500 and the tab count be increased from 10,000 to 25,000.

Pull-Tabs – Petition for Rule Change

WAC 230-30-045

The Washington Charitable and Civic Gaming Association is requesting that carry-over jackpot pull-tab payouts be increased from \$2,000 to \$5,000 and the tab count be increased from 6,000 to 10,000.

Amusement Games - Petition for Rule Change

WAC 230-20-685

Nickels and Dimes, Inc., a licensed amusement game operator, is requesting that wager limits for amusement games be increased from \$0.50 to \$2.00.

Bingo – Petition for Rule Change

WAC 230-20-102

The Tacoma American Veterans Bingo is requesting that bingo licensees no longer be required to record the address of winners of cash or merchandise bingo prizes of \$20 or less.

The proposed change would also give licensees the option to record bingo winners under \$20 on a prize receipt log, rather than on a separate prize receipt. The rule requires a bingo prize receipt to be completed for each prize awarded at bingo games with the exception that merchandise prizes with a cost or fair market value of \$15 or less may be receipted on a single log sheet as allowed in subsection (4) of the rule.

The petitioner requests that cash and merchandise prizes of \$20 or less be receipted on a prize receipt log.

Proposed Rule Changes Up for Final Action at the August 10, 2007, Commission meeting

Bingo – Petition for Rule Change

WAC 230-20-244



The Washington Charitable and Civic Gaming Association is requesting that paper cards, for electronic bingo card daubers, no longer be distributed to players. Instead, the card would be printed, placed in a master index and made available to players and Commission staff upon request.

Chip Destruction - Staff Proposal

New Rule: WAC 230-40-817

Staff proposes a new rule to expand and codify requirements to maintain control over logo chips when a card room goes out of business or changes its logo.

Currently, card room licensees submit Internal Controls outlining how they will dispose of logo chips. The new rule will require the following to be included in the Internal Controls:

- Chip destruction log;
- Method of destruction;
- Designate the departments responsible for overseeing chip destruction. At least one licensed employee must be from the accounting department; and
- Procedures to be followed if the licensee's chip inventory becomes obsolete (i.e. card room changes its name, or its license is revoked, expired, or voluntarily surrendered).

Amusement Game Target Area - Staff Proposal

WAC 230-20-508, WAC 230-20-650

Staff proposes clarifying the “four square inch” requirement for the size of the target or target areas used in coin/token toss amusement games.

Coin/token toss amusement games are games where players toss one or more coins or tokens onto a surface or into a target area. These types of games are primarily operated at carnivals and agricultural fairs.

The original intent of the rule was to have a target area twice as big as the object being tossed. The object being tossed is usually a quarter; therefore, the “four square inch” criteria was used because two quarters fit into four square inches. This ensures there is a true opportunity to win a prize.

When agents inspect coin/token toss games they ensure the games are operated fairly and that the outcome of the game depends, to a material degree, on the skill of the player.

While performing inspections at amusement game locations, agents discovered that a target or target area could be more than four square inches in size but a prize could be very difficult to win because of the oblong shape of the target. One example is the “Rainbow coin/token toss game”.



In this game, each arc of the rainbow was a target area. The outside arc of the rainbow was four square inches.

However, because this target area was long and narrow it was difficult for players to toss the quarter and have it land completely in the target area.

The proposed change ensures players have a true opportunity to win a prize.

- Allows the Director to issue orders of summary suspensions to individual licensees and other businesses for serious violations.
- Military personnel can renew their licenses if they have been deployed and their license expired during deployment.

2) **Public Disclosure Exemption for House-Banked Card Room Financial Statements** (HB 1449)

Creates a public disclosure exemption for independent auditor reports and financial statements required by the Commission for house-banked card rooms.

3) **State Employee Raffles for Executive Branch Employees** (HB 1599)

4) **Removes the Sunset Clause for the Limited Waiver of Sovereign Immunity for Tribal Compacts** (HB 1706)

Two Agency Request Bills that Died.

1) **Create penalties against minors who gamble** (HB 1345/SB 5375)

These companion bills create penalties for underage gamblers. Gambling Commission Special Agents would issue civil infractions to underage gamblers; the civil infraction has a \$125 fine plus required statutory fees, making the actual fine \$257, and the possibility of 4 hours of community supervision and court costs. HB 1345 passed the House by a 94:1 vote.

2) **Create a barring list** (SHB 1346/SSB 5374)

These companion bills create a barring list for individuals:

- Who are career or professional offenders or involved in organized crime;
- Who have been convicted of a criminal violation of a gambling law of any state or of the United States, or who have been convicted of any felony including, but not limited to, theft, extortion, conspiracy to defraud, or any similar offense involving, or in connection with, any gambling activity; or
- Who have been excluded under similar involuntary exclusion laws or rules of any other state or nation that regulates gambling.

Because the reasons for getting on the list are limited, we expect about twenty people would be put on the list each year. Other states have similar barring lists.

These bills passed out of the respective committees, but “died” in Rules. We plan to work on both of these proposals again during the 2008 session.
