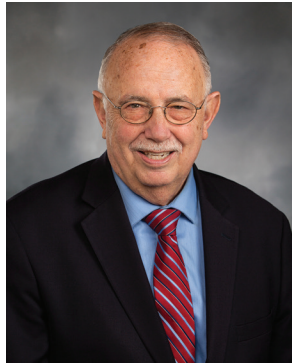

Chair Levy called the virtual meeting to order at 9:32AM and mentioned that TVW would be livestreaming the meeting. Director Griffin called the roll to confirm a quorum.

There were 2 people in the audience and 43 people virtually.

Tab 1

Consent Agenda

Commissioner Sizemore moved to approve the consent agenda as presented by staff.

Commissioner Patterson seconded the motion.

The motion passed. 5:0

Public Comment:

Chair Levy asked for public comment. There was none.

Tab 2

Presentation – Special Olympics Washington

Tony Czar, Special Agent (SA) in the Regulation Unit presented the materials for this tab. He introduced the Special Olympics Washington (SOWA) 2022 Dream Adventure raffle and their staff. Mary Do, Chief Operating Officer (CFO) for Special Olympics Washington thanked the commission and gave a brief overview of the raffle. Commissioner Sizemore asked CFO Do to clarify why SOWA decided to not do a Dream House raffle this time. CFO Do said *"the enhanced raffle that would include the house, and that would normally take place in January, kickoff in January. We'd come back to you in probably a month or so here. Then this Dream Adventure raffle that would not include a house, there is no threshold for the second raffle. I think just to expand on some of the things that I had mentioned earlier, is really to be able to*

kind of build that base. It is a lower ticket price in comparison to what the house raffle was, which is \$150. The Dream Adventure raffle would be \$50. That will allow us to do a couple things, is to reach folks that may have not been able to participate in the house raffle and grow our participant base, which would, one, then again in domino, allow us to engage more folks into the mission.” **Commissioner Sizemore** asked a follow up question regarding generating revenue. **CFO Do** deferred this follow up questions to SOWA’s Vice President of Accounting and Administration(VPAA), Mark Sinay. **VPAA Sinay** explained that the Fall Dream raffle has a lower cost which could give generate a potential 20% higher return. **Commissioner Patterson** asked if the raffle was statewide and if there would be two raffles on the westside of the state and two raffles on the eastside of the state. **CFO Do** clarified that there would only be two raffles total and all tickets will be placed in the same bucket for the whole state and the drawings will occur at the Special Olympics Washington office in Seattle.

Chair Levy asked for public comment. She also asked Julie Anderson if there were any emails and Nicole Frazer if there were any chats regarding this topic. There was no public comment.

Commissioner Patterson moved to approve the Special Olympics Washington to conduct a Dream Adventures raffle as presented by staff.

Rule Petition to Amend

Jess Lohse, Acting Rules Coordinator (ARC) presented the materials for this rule amendment.

Petitioner Corey Lowell, from Northshore Senior Center of Bothell is proposing to amend WAC 230-06-045, to allow an organization with multiple physical locations to operate bingo games under one license. The petitioner decided to withdraw his petition at this time.

Tab 5

Agency Request Legislation for 2023

Tommy Oakes, Interim Legislative Liaison (ILL) presented the materials for this tab. **ILL Oakes** presented ideas for agency request legislation based on staff and stakeholder feedback. This feedback also included tribal perspective. At the May meeting Commissioner Reeves asked staff to look at how other agencies hire a director. Staff replied to the similarities and differences and why the Gambling Commissioners are tasked with selecting and hiring a Director. Commissioner Sizemore asked Human Recourse Director Lisa Benavidez to write a Standard Operating Procedure manual so that the process to which the Commissioners just went through by hiring Director Griffin could be memorialized. She agreed. IIL Oakes spoke about Promotional Contest of Chance as a potential agency request.

Representative Kloba asked staff to elaborate on Promotional Contests of Chance with some examples. Staff agreed to provide an example at the August meeting.

Commissioner Sizemore moved to approve Promotional Contests of Chance issue to be considered for Agency Request Legislation.

Commissioner Patterson seconded the motion.

The motion passed. 5:0

ILL Oakes discussed SB 5051 and highlighted the inconsistency in certification and training for, “Limited authority Washington Peace Officer”, as defined in RCW 10.93.020. The agency is interested in obtaining and maintaining certification that could be denied, suspended, or revoked by WSCJTC and be mandated to be trained by the WSCJTC.

Commissioner Sizemore moved to elevate law enforcement certification and training proposal to the agency request legislation.

Commissioner Reeves seconded the motion.

The motion passed. 5:0

Tab 6

Presentation – FY 23 Budget Proposal

Krisinda Hansen, Chief Financial Officer (CFO) presented the material for this tab. CFO Hansen presented an update on the agencies fund balance and proposed changes to budget based on more accurate data. CFO Hansen explained the operating level and vacancies. She explained the personnel costs and salary increase that was effective July 1, 2022. Senator Conway asked if state salaries compare to private business and if that could be the challenges with hiring. Director Griffin explained that hiring is very challenging. She also expressed staffs concerns regarding the recent vaccination requirements and the agency potentially facing another staffing shortage. Senator Conway expressed concerns about being able to hire limited law enforcement officers.

Director Griffin explained that out of 60 commissioned positions, the agency is down 25%.

Senator Conway asked if the state recognizes the need and the challenges for the agency.

Director Griffin stated “*Our agents are exempt. So, with that, they are obviously not under a collective bargaining agreement, as other limited jurisdiction agencies are potentially. So, our agents are not afforded those additional pay opportunities that some of our counterparts received based on those collective bargaining agreements for retention and hiring.*” Also, the agency is a non-appropriated agency.

Senator Conway asked about the loan that was given to the agency from the state budget for sports betting . CFO Hansen explained that we paid back three million plus interest prior to June 30, 2022, leaving the agency with three million plus interest.

Commissioner Sizemore moved to approve the FY 23 amended budget as presented by staff.

Chair Levy reconvened day two of the May Commission meeting at 9:37AM for and Director Griffin called the roll to confirm a quorum.

Public Comment was provided by Nanci Watson, private citizen addressed the Commissioners and stated, *“I just sent along to you as well, a written copy of the subject that I'm addressing and also some background material because what I wanted to comment on is the recent Supreme Court case regarding state jurisdiction over certain criminal matters in Indian country, or in most cases this would just mean on an Indian reservation where you would have state jurisdiction. And I have to admit I found this to be kind of electrifying because I'm involved in the Problem Gambling Task Force, and I know that when we think about reservations in Washington, we normally think of it only from the standpoint that the state has no jurisdiction. I mean, that's like the first thing you learn, and then you learn it every step of the way, and not only that but all the reasons why all the reasons why you could never trust state to have jurisdiction. It could only be the federal authorities that would have jurisdiction. Well in this recent Supreme Court case, which involved a criminal matter in Oklahoma. And if you guys are fans of reading the newspaper, I'm sure you've read about it. They have come to some amazing conclusions, and they even give us a little bit of a history lesson, and they talk about why it was in the early 1800s. That it was so important not to have states like Georgia getting involved on Indian reservations because the stuff that was going on in the early 1800s was, and I don't want to quote former President Trump, but it was wild. I'll just say that it was really wild what was going on. They say that at one point, State of Georgia sold to speculators, land speculators, three times as much acreage as they even had under their control. And this was land where tribes were settled, and it was an amazingly horrific situation. So, the Supreme Court has unbelievably gone all the way back through the history why this was such a big deal in the 1800s, and that how did it happen that our government decided that a reservation was actually part of a state and that the federal government and the state government had to take jurisdiction hand in hand and work cooperatively on problems of concern to each and how the tribes figured in. Anyway, I won't say*

anything more, I feel like I'm publicizing a racy novel, but I'm telling you, these people on the Supreme Court have won my respect in a way that I find very surprising. Sometimes you hear decisions from the Supreme Court, and you might even think these people are dopes. I know you guys aren't so just courteous as I am, but reading this thing, I'm like, "Wow, these people are super, super smart." So that's all I wanted to say. I've passed along a copy of the decision and all their arguments. If anybody wants to read it, I think we're going to hear more about this in the future. That's my comment. Thank you for your time."

Chair Levy announced that the Commissioners would be going into Executive Session for the purpose to discuss current and potential agency litigation with legal counsel, including tribal negotiations. This is anticipated to take three hours adjourning around 12:30 PM. The Commission will return to the public meeting for adjournment only.

Executive Session adjourned at 12:25 PM and the public meeting adjourned at 12:25 PM.



The Tribal Liaison will work closely with the Deputy Director and Assistant Director regarding tribal topics.

The Legislative, Policy and Training Unit will include a Legislative and Policy Manager, who will report to the Deputy Director. The Legislative and Policy Manager will work with me on legislative matters.

Recruitment for Leadership Positions

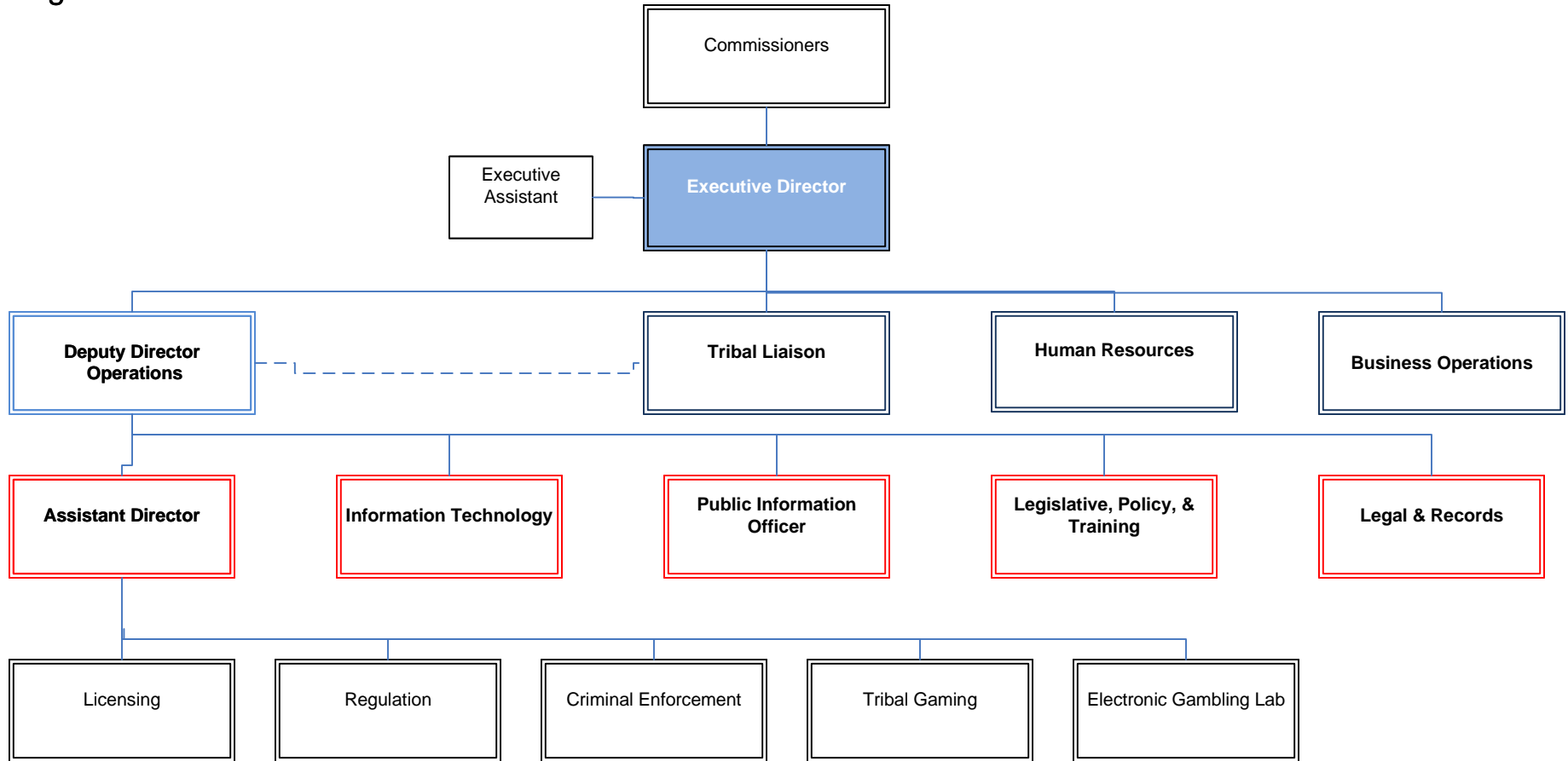

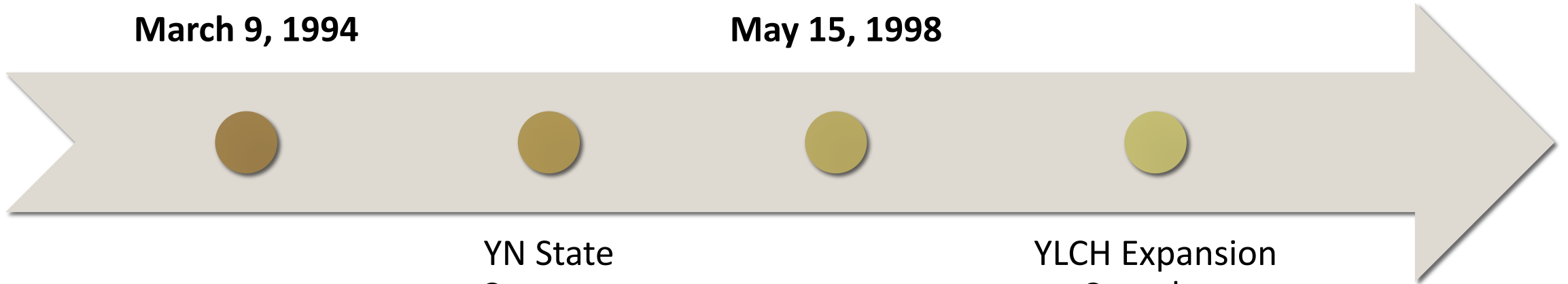

SUBJECT: **Boys & Girls Clubs of the Columbia Basin. Request to offer a raffle prize that exceeds \$40,000 and exceed \$300,000 limit in Raffle Prizes Paid during the License Year.**

Background

Our rules require licensees to get your approval prior to offering a raffle prize that exceeds \$40,000 and/or offering raffle prizes that exceed \$300,000 in a licensee year, WAC 230-11-067.

To seek that approval, the licensee must submit a raffle plan that includes:

- (a) The organization's goals for conducting the raffle; and
- (b) A brief overview of the licensee's mission and vision including the type of programs supported by the licensee and clients served; and
- (c) Specific details of the raffle rules including:
 - (i) Date of the drawing; and
 - (ii) Cost of raffle tickets; and
 - (iii) Prizes available; and
 - (iv) Security of prizes; and
 - (v) Plans for selling raffle tickets; and
 - (vi) Description of how the licensee protects the integrity of the raffle; and
- (d) An explanation of how the proceeds from the raffle will be used; and
- (e) A plan to protect the licensee in the event of low ticket sales and other risks; and
- (f) An explanation of how the licensee will purchase the prize(s) for the raffle; and
- (g) A projected budget including:
 - (i) Estimated gross gambling receipts, expenses, and net income for the raffle; and
 - (ii) Minimum number of projected ticket sales to break even; and
 - (iii) Corresponding sales and prize levels with projected revenues and expenses for each level; and
 - (iv) Minimum and maximum prizes available; and
- (h) Any other information that we request or any information the licensee wishes to submit.

Request for Your Approval

Boys & Girls Club of the Columbia Basin requests your approval to offer a raffle prize in excess of \$40,000 and offer raffle prizes over \$300,000. They are estimating the house build costs to be \$250,000 with a FMV of \$400,000. The cost and estimated value may fluctuate between the time of this request and the date of the drawing in July of 2023.

Staff recommends you approve Boys & Girls Club of the Columbia Basin to offer a raffle prize in excess of \$40,000 and to exceed the annual raffle prize limit of \$300,000 for their license year ending March 31, 2024.

Raffle Plan to exceed a \$40,000 prize and \$300,000/year

Organization Overview

The stated mission of the Boys & Girls Clubs of the Columbia Basin (BGCCB) is *to enable all young people, especially those who need us most, to reach their full potential as productive, caring, responsible citizens.*

In pursuit of this mission, BGCCB currently operates six after-school club locations and two full-day summer camp locations for kids ages 5 to 18. Additionally, the organization provides free meals in the summer months to all youth, ages 2 to 18, in the Moses Lake area. In 2021, we served 27,413 youth in our year-round affordable and free programs, focusing on all aspects of youth development. The organization was incorporated in 1994 and received non-profit status in 1996.

We currently employ 30 part-time and 8 full-time team members and have nearly 100 volunteers, including a 17-member volunteer Board of Directors.

Raffle Fundraising Goals

The goal of the Boys & Girls Clubs of the Columbia Basin is to conduct an authorized raffle as a means to replace some of the funding lost due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Over 50% of the revenue needed to fund our operations is typically generated by donations from individuals and local businesses, plus grant funding from various public and private sources.

Like many communities across the state, our town of Moses Lake suffered substantial personal and business losses during the two-year emergency phase of the pandemic, which negatively impacted, and continues to impact, our local fundraising potential. Additionally, we learned in January that \$300,000 in anticipated grant funding (nearly one-third of our budgeted revenue) would not be received in this calendar year. The grants previously received but not approved for 2022 include triple-digit funding through OSPI and SOWA. Additional grant applications denied in 2022 include various amounts from the Paul Lauzier Charitable Foundation and the WA State Department of Commerce. Since then, we have discussed ways to make up for that loss. We implemented a different campaign in April to develop new local individual and business donors and are planning to enhance our annual auction in October to raise more money than ever before; however, these strategies will not come close to making up a \$300,000 loss. Therefore, we began focusing on something bigger that would make a true impact. The resulting concept is to host a raffle for a new house. Our estimates show that we have the potential to recover the \$300,000 and substantially more if the raffle is successful.

Obtaining a new home below market value is one of the key elements to maximizing revenue from the house raffle. We knew we had to partner with a philanthropic-minded construction company, so we approached CAD Homes, a local home builder known for building high-quality, affordable family homes. To our surprise, the response was an immediate and enthusiastic yes! Once we received this news, we began working with our fundraising committee and our Board of Directors to create an aggressive yet realistic plan to coordinate and promote the raffle and achieve our fundraising goals.

About CAD Homes

CAD Homes, LLC is a locally-based, privately-owned residential construction company. Founded by Alan Scott and co-owned by his son Drew Scott, the company has been building custom homes, semi-custom homes, and developing entire neighborhoods in Moses Lake and surrounding communities since 2014. The company and owners have consistently demonstrated a commitment to supporting the local community and philanthropic causes. They also support their employees to give back by offering paid volunteer hours to participate in the causes important to them. BGCCB is thrilled to partner with the CAD Homes team to provide a quality-built home in a desirable neighborhood that the raffle prize winner will be proud to own.

Raffle Logistics

- Submit a special license proposal to Washington State Gambling Commission by 6/27/22.
- Present plan at the August 2022 meeting of the Gambling Commission (September at the latest).
- Publicly kick off the raffle at our annual fundraising auction on 10/1/22.
- Sell 7,500 to 10,000 tickets between 10/1/22 and 7/1/23.
- Hold ticket drawing at the local FreedomFest on Saturday, 7/1/23.

Date of the drawing

Drawing to be held Saturday, July 1, 2023, at 9:00 pm. It is slated to take place at the annual Fourth of July festival known as FreedomFest, located at McCosh Park in downtown Moses Lake. Being present at the drawing is not required to win.

Cost of raffle tickets

All tickets will be sold for \$100 each. There will be no discount pricing. A maximum of 10,000 tickets will be available for sale. A minimum of 5,000 tickets will need to be sold in order for the grand prize to be awarded.

Grand prize

The raffle grand prize is a new construction home to be located in a housing development known as the Sage Point Development. It is in a family neighborhood near an elementary school. Construction by CAD Homes, LLC is slated to begin in December 2022 and conclude in March 2023. Plan 1387 is the house to be built. (The floor plan and elevation drawings are attached to this document.) The home is a three-bedroom, two-bath, single-level home with a two-car garage. It has 1,387 square feet of living space with a 459 square-foot garage. The current market value is estimated at \$400,000.

Cash Prize and Low-Ticket Sales Alternatives

Assuming minimum ticket sales of 5,000 tickets, the raffle drawing winner will have the option of a \$100,000 cash prize or receipt of the newly built house. If less than 5,000 tickets are sold (1 - 4,999), the house will not be awarded, and an alternative low ticket sales cash prize of 50% of net proceeds (gross proceeds minus expenses) will be awarded with a guaranteed minimum prize of \$5,000.

Additional prizes

There are no additional prizes planned at this time.

Security of prizes

An agreement between BGCCB and the home builder, CAD Homes, LLC, states that CAD Homes, LLC will retain the title and insurance, and assume full liability of the home until the prize drawing is held, at which time the title will be transferred directly to the raffle winner. Should the winner choose the home as their raffle prize, Boys & Girls Clubs of the Columbia Basin will pay directly to CAD Homes, LLC the

pre-approved amount of direct expenses before the title is transferred to the winner. Should the raffle winner elect to take the cash prize alternative, BGCCB will not pay any expenses associated with the building of the home; instead, CAD Homes, LLC will retain ownership and sell the home at its current market value. The Boys & Girls Clubs of the Columbia Basin commits to having sufficient funds on hand to purchase the house or pay the \$100,000 cash alternative prior to the date of the drawing.

Previous Raffle Experience

Boys & Girls Clubs of the Columbia Basin is adept at raffle administration since it has traditionally conducted a Duck Derby Raffle. This raffle event has taken place for eight consecutive years, from 2012 to 2019, then was canceled in 2020 and 2021 due to pandemic restrictions.

Raffle Administration

All money from raffle ticket sales will be held in a separate bank account until the prize drawing and awarding of prizes. At that time, the expenses incurred by BGCCB in the marketing and administration of the raffle promotion and our obligation for the cost of raffle prizes will be reimbursed to the organization.

Ticket Security

Oversight of ticket sales will be managed by designated Members of the Boys & Girls Clubs of Columbia Basin's management team. Board members will also share in this responsibility.

All tickets will be sequentially numbered, and blocks of tickets checked out to Board members, management, and volunteers for sales purposes.

A Club management representative or Board Member will assume responsibility for oversight of ticket sales at selected local businesses by assigning tickets by number, then collecting ticket sales money or any unsold tickets on a weekly basis.

A financial or accounting professional associated with BGCCB will provide ticket sales tracking and reporting to the Board of Directors on a monthly basis. All unsold tickets will be kept in a safe with limited access to designated personnel.

Each ticket sold will include the purchaser's full name, phone number, email address, and mailing address. The BGCCB office will maintain a spreadsheet of ticket numbers and the associated purchaser's contact information.

Raffle ticket sales plan

Tickets will be available for sale from October 1, 2022, through July 1, 2023.

- Ticket sales will begin at the annual auction fundraising event on Saturday, October 1, 2022.
- Immediately following the auction, tickets will be available for sale at selected local area businesses, including the Boys & Girls Clubs of the Columbia Basin office.
- Tickets will also be sold at the local Farmers Market, which takes place monthly on Saturdays from December through April and weekly on Saturdays from May through October.
- Tickets will also be sold at local community events, such as:
 - The Harvest Festival in downtown Moses Lake, on Saturday, October 29, 2022
 - The Tree Lighting ceremony, downtown Moses Lake, on Friday, November 11, 2022
 - The Ag Parade, downtown Moses Lake, on Friday, December 2, 2022
 - The Annual Spring Fest, which takes place in Moses Lake over Memorial weekend, May 26 – 29, 2023

Marketing Plan

In addition to marketing the house raffle at the above-mentioned community and statewide events, it will also be promoted as follows:

Phase I – During this phase, BGCCB will employ low-cost promotion methods through public relations, community relations, and social media, plus a limited amount of paid local advertising.

- House Raffle information on BGCCB website.
- Social media posting and boosting.
- Press announcements to major market broadcast media, such as TV stations KING 5, KOMO 4, and KIRO 7 in Seattle and KHQ 6, KXLY 4, and KREM 2 in Spokane.
- Press announcements to major market and local radio stations such as The Quake 102.1 FM, in Wenatchee, KWIQ, KDRM & KBSN, in Moses Lake, KUBE, KPLZ, KZOK, KRWM, KCMS, KKWF, and KQMV in Seattle, and BIG 99.9, K102 Country, NOW 105.7, 103.9 BOB FM, KISS 98.1, and JOY 104.5 in Spokane.
- Press announcements to local and major market newspapers such as the Columbia Basin Herald, Seattle Times, and Spokesman Review.
- Local advertising in the print and online versions of the Columbia Basin Herald and online news source iFiber.com

Phase II – If ticket sales are not reaching targeted numbers using low-cost promotional methods and participation in community and statewide events, a portion of the marketing budget has been allocated to incorporate paid media advertising.

- Digital and search engine advertising to drive traffic to the BGCCB website.
- Paid TV advertising in the major media markets of Seattle-Puget Sound and Spokane.
- Paid radio advertising in the major media markets of Seattle-Puget Sound and Spokane.
- Paid print advertising in local and major market newspapers such as the Seattle Times and Spokesman Review.

Use of Raffle Proceeds

The raffle proceeds will be used as follows:

All raffle incurred expenses will be paid back to the organization. Planned expenses include payment to the builder of pre-determined hard costs associated with the construction of the home (estimated at \$250,000) or payment of the \$100,000 cash prize, plus expenses incurred as a result of implementing the sales and marketing plan.

All remaining funds will be used as follows:

Assuming the minimum ticket sales threshold of 5,000 tickets is accomplished:

- Half of the net proceeds will be used for expenses associated with the operation of year-round after-school programs and full-day camps during Spring and Summer Break, for local school-aged youth.

- Half of the net proceeds will be placed in an endowment fund for investment and future operating expenses of the Club.

If the minimum ticket threshold of 5,000 ticket sales is not met, all of the net proceeds (gross proceeds minus expenses), minus the cash prize to the raffle ticket winner, may be dedicated to ongoing operational expenses, as determined by the Board of Directors.

Note – assuming the raffle is successful, it is our intention to host a house raffle event once per year for a three-year period. This will assist with our longer-range planning and funding.

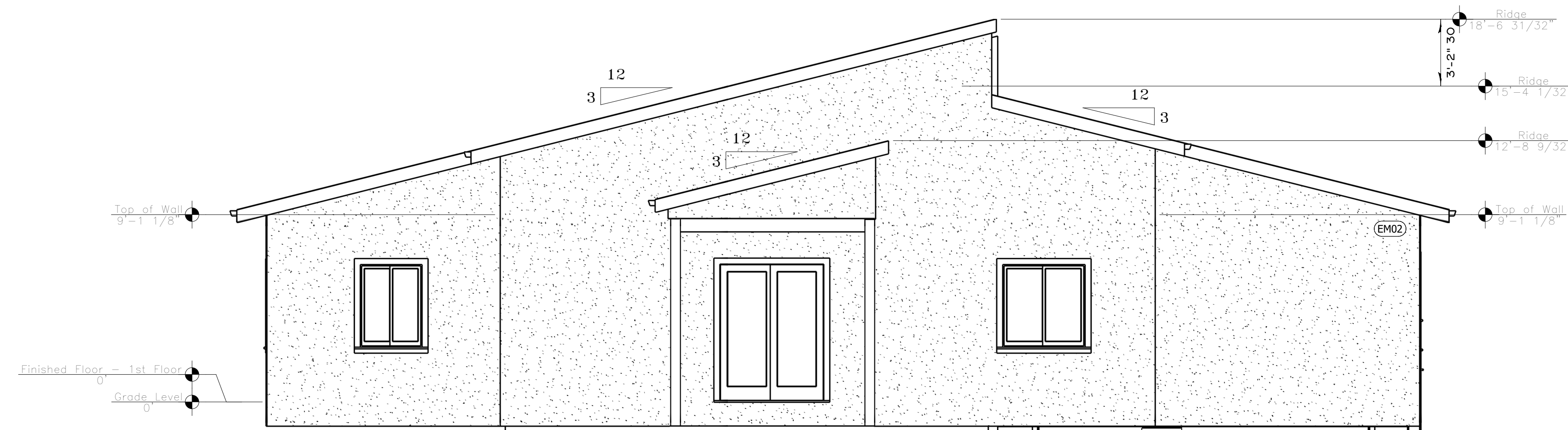
E1 Left Elevation

Who Proposed the Rule Change?

Taek Kim, owner of Meeker St Bar & Grill in Kent, Washington

Background

Taek Kim, owner of Meeker St Bar & Grill in Kent, Washington is proposing to amend WAC 230-14-260 to no longer require licensed pull-tab operators to write the date they put a pull-tab series in play on the purchase invoice. The petitioner specifically wants to strike subsection (2) (b) of WAC 230-14-260.

The petitioner feels this change is needed because the requirement to write the date they place every pull-tab series in play on purchase invoices adds additional hardships for operators who do not use pull-tab point of sale/inventory systems. The petitioner noted that many operators already write the “date in play” information on the flare of the game or other separate tracking records after they place games in play. The petitioner feels that writing the date in play information also on the purchase invoices is duplication and not efficient. Furthermore, the petitioner feels that the date in play information written on purchase invoices does not add value to inventory control.

The petitioner feels that amending the rule in question will be positive for pull-tab operators who do not use pull-tab point-of-sale/inventory systems because it will save them time from trying to find pull-tab games on purchase invoices to write the date in play.

Policy Considerations

Staff has the following policy concerns:

- WAC 230-14-260 is about inventory control. Licensed pull-tab operators are required to account for all their pull-tab inventory from the time they receive games until the time they remove them from play. The “date in play” information is important and needed in order to complete required pull-tab monthly records. Commission staff recognizes that operators may write the date in play information on the pull-tab game’s flare after they place it in play, however, that is not required by any rule. Some operators also write the date in play information on other tracking records separately prepared by the operator, however, that is also not required by any rule.
- Operators that use point-of-sale/inventory systems are not required to write in ink the date in play information on purchase invoices. However, they still must type in the date in play information into the computerized system for game tracking purposes and so that the required monthly income summary can be generated with the information. The advantage of the computerized system is that the operator does not have to look through possibly dozens of pages of purchase invoices to find a single game to write the date in play information on.

Staff Recommendation

Under the requirements of the Administrative Procedure Act, the Commission must take action on a petition within 60 days of receiving it. Your options are:

- 1) Initiate rule-making proceedings by filing the rule as proposed for further discussion; or
- 2) Deny the petition in writing, a) stating the reasons for denial and specifically address the concerns stated in the petition, or b) where appropriate, indicate alternative means by which the agency will address the concerns raised in the petition.

Staff recommends initiating rule-making that would address any policy concerns.

Furthermore, additional "put in date" data doesn't serve additional value to anyone. This rule was put into place before invoices are generated with I.D. stamp numbers with the advent of technology.

Inventory control.

(1) Punch board and pull-tab operators must control and account for each punch board and pull-tab series they obtain. Operators must:

(a) Enter the I.D. stamp numbers for the series in all records; and

(b) Attach the packing slip to the original invoice if the pull-tab series is packed in more than one container; and

(c) Record each pull-tab dispenser they purchase.

(2) Distributors must record every purchase of punch boards or pull-tabs on an invoice. Operators must use this record to account for each series between the time they purchase it and the time they remove it from play. Invoices must include space for the operator to attach:

(a) The I.D. stamp numbers for each board or series; and

(b) The date they placed the punch board or pull-tab series out for play.

(3) When operators receive punch boards or pull-tab series, they must ensure that the manufacturer or distributor recorded all required data by comparing the Washington state identification stamp number attached to each punch board and pull-tab series to the number recorded on the purchase invoice.

(4) Operators may use a separate computerized inventory record as long as they:

(a) Use an I.D. stamp or print a computer generated facsimile of the stamp number on the inventory record; and

(b) Record all other required information.

Who Proposed the Rule Change?

Vicki Christophersen, Representing Maverick Gaming in Kirkland, Washington

Background

Vicki Christophersen, representing Maverick Gaming, is proposing to amend WAC 230-15-140 as follows:

- Increase the maximum single wagering limit from \$300 to \$500 for all house-banked gaming tables. Provided that if the licensee has a “high limit room” they may increase the single wagering limit to \$1,000 for a select number of high limit tables as follows:
 - Cardrooms with 1-5 total tables – no more than 1 high limit table; or
 - Cardrooms with 6-10 total tables – no more than 2 high limit tables; or
 - Cardrooms with 11-15 total tables – no more than 3 high limit tables.
- Add a definition of “high limit room” meaning a clearly identified area of the gaming facility separated by a permanent physical barrier or a separate room in the gaming facility.
- Restrict access to high limit tables in the high limit room to only prescreened players and players who are not self-excluded from gambling or exhibit problem gambling behaviors.

The petitioner feels this change is needed for several reasons:

- To reflect current economic conditions and customer demand; and
- Wagering limits have not been increased since 2009 and operating costs have increased significantly since then; and
- Minimum wage has nearly doubled since 2009 and supply chain issues and inflation has had a negative impact on card room revenue; and
- To keep the wagering limits for card rooms fair and consistent with competitors, specifically Tribal casinos. Tribal compacts have been steadily amended to increase wagering limits at their casinos.

The petitioner feels the effect of this rule change will allow house-banked card rooms to compete on a more level playing field with Tribal casinos. The petitioner also believes the rule change will allow for the preservation of family wage jobs and economic contributions to the communities they are part of. Lastly, the petitioner feels that the rule change will provide increased tax collection for the local jurisdictions they operate house-banked card rooms in.

Policy Considerations

Pursuant to RCW 9.46.0282, the number of tables in a card room shall not exceed a total of fifteen

separate tables. The petitioner is not requesting to operate more than fifteen tables. Rather, the petitioner is requesting that the wagering limits be increased from \$300 to \$500 on all tables with the ability to raise limits to \$1,000 for a select number of high limit tables.

House-banked card rooms opened up in 1997 where wagering limits for games were set at \$25. In 2000, wagering limits increased to \$100, in 2004 to \$200, and lastly in 2009 to the current limit of \$300.

In 2016, the Commission received a petition from the Recreational Gaming Association (RGA) requesting the Commission to increase wager limits to \$500 that would match the limits of Tribal gaming operations at that time. The Commission accepted the petition for further discussion, but the RGA eventually withdrew their request after hearing Commissioner concerns about increasing the wager limit and problem gambling.

In January 2022, the Commission received a petition from Tim Merrill with Maverick Gaming requesting the Commission to increase wagering limits to \$500 with the ability to raise the limit to \$1,000 on 25% of tables. The petition was withdrawn by Tim Merrill prior to the Commissioners taking any action.

Additional rulemaking will be needed to address policy concerns, new definitions, and possible new requirements.

Staff Recommendation

Under the requirements of the Administrative Procedure Act, the Commission must take action on a petition within 60 days of receiving it. Your options are:

- 1) Initiate rule-making proceedings by filing the rule as proposed for further discussion; or
- 2) Deny the petition in writing, a) stating the reasons for denial and specifically address the concerns stated in the petition, or b) where appropriate, indicate alternative means by which the agency will address the concerns raised in the petition.

==Amend Rule – I am requesting WSGC to change an existing rule.==

List rule number (WAC) if known: WAC 230-15-140

I am requesting the following change:

Request changes to WAC 230-15-140 to update and reflect current economic conditions. Suggested changes for consideration include:

1. Amend requirements to allow a maximum bet at cardrooms of five hundred dollars (\$500)
2. Amend requirements to allow a designated high limit room consisting of a limited number of tables.
 - a. Tables could be limited in the following manner:
 - i. Cardrooms with 1-5 total tables – no more than 1 high limit table
 - ii. Cardrooms with 6-10 total tables – no more than 2 high limit tables
 - iii. Cardrooms with 11-15 total tables – no more than 3 high limit tables
3. Recommend that the single wager at a high limit table must not exceed one thousand dollars (\$1000).
4. Suggested definitions:
 - a. "High Limit Room" means a clearly identified area of the Gaming Facility separated by a permanent, physical barrier or a separate room in the Gaming Facility.
 - b. "Permanent, physical barrier" includes a partial wall, fence or similar separation. Stanchions or similar movable barriers are not considered a permanent, physical barrier.
5. Suggested requirements:
 - a. Access to the tables in a High Limit Room will be

subject to prescreening qualifications and screening process.

b. Require that no customers may participate in gaming in a High Limit Room if they are known to the Gaming Operation to have

a history of problem gambling or currently barred for self-exclusion, or known by the Gaming Operation as demonstrating

significant characteristics associated with problem gambling.

This change is needed because:

Wager limits need to be updated to reflect current economic conditions and customer demand. Wager limits for House banked card rooms have been set at three hundred dollars (\$300) since 2009. In the 13 years since the limit was established, operating costs have increased dramatically. Since 2009, Washington minimum wage has nearly doubled. Additionally, supply change issues and inflation have an impact on revenue. Once a significant driver of revenue and employment at our properties, our food & beverage business is not sustainable on a standalone basis in the current cost inflation environment without the support of stronger gaming revenues.

Tribal compacts have been steadily being amended to increase the wager limits at their properties. This proposal is modeled after those changes and reflects the same protections. Although a small percentage of the guests that visit cardrooms (less than 3%) would take advantage of the increase, these customers are a critical component of financial stability.

The effect of this rule change will be: The impact of allowing higher wagers will allow cardrooms to operate on a more level playing field. This will allow for the preservation of family wage jobs and economic contributions to the communities we are a part of. Additionally, it will provide increased tax collection for our local jurisdictions.

Wagering limits for house-banked card games.

(1) A single wager must not exceed three hundred dollars.

(2) A player may make a single wager for each decision before the dealer deals or reveals additional cards. Wagers must be placed on the table layout on an approved betting spot, except for:

(a) In Blackjack games, players may place an additional wager next to their original wager when doubling down or splitting pairs; or

(b) Tip wagers made on behalf of a dealer; or

(c) As authorized in approved card games rules.

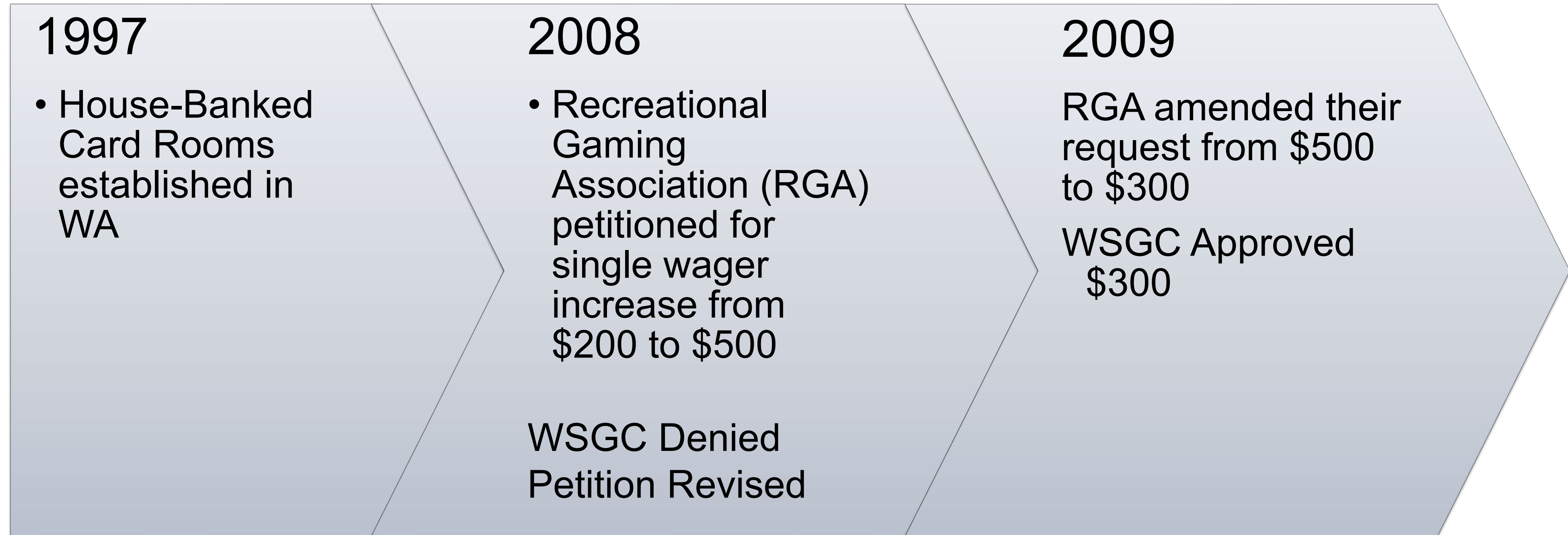


Wager Limit Increase Proposal

- Amend bet limit allow five hundred dollars (\$500)
- Amend requirements to allow designated high limit room consisting of limited number of tables with a single wager not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1000).
 - Card rooms with 1-4 total tables may have 1 high limit table
 - Cardrooms with 6-10 total tables may have 2 high limit tables
 - Cardrooms with 11-15 tables may have 3 high limit tables
- “High Limit Room” means a clearly identified area of the Gaming Facility separated by a permanent, physical barrier or a separate room in the Gaming Facility.
- “Permanent, physical barrier” includes a partial wall, fence, or similar separation. Stanchions or similar movable barriers are not considered a permanent, physical barrier.
- Access to the tables in a High Limit Room will be subject to prescreening qualifications and screening process.
- No customers may participate in Gaming in a High Limit Room if they are known to the Gaming Operation to have a history of problem gambling or currently barred for self-exclusion or known by the Gaming Operation as demonstrating significant characteristics associated with problem gambling.

Pandemic Impacts and Mitigation

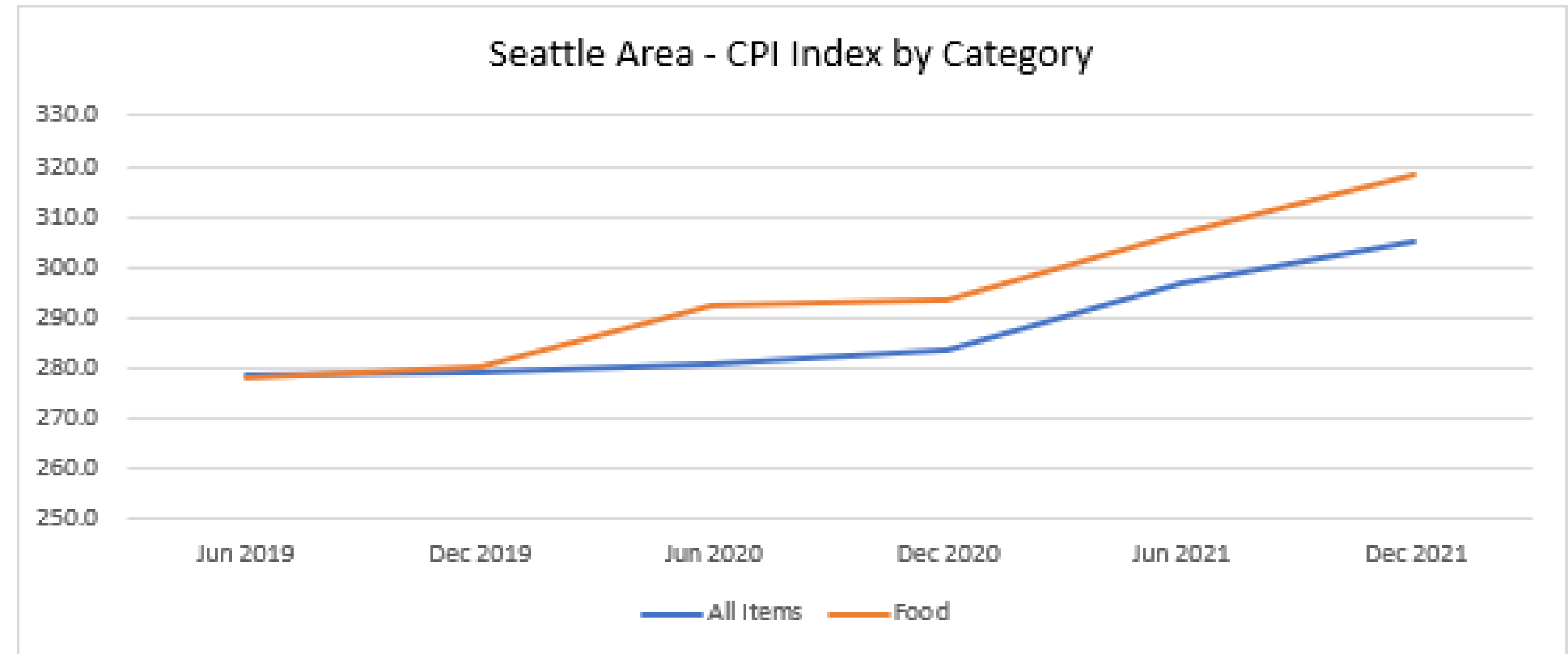


- Maverick Gaming swiftly partnered with public health officials in responding to the threat of COVID-19, publishing a leading health and safety guidelines plan for all of its properties.
- Unlike Tribal Gaming properties, cardrooms were shutdown from 3/17 to 6/11 in 2020. Maverick Gaming offered reduced hours outdoors at limited locations from 8/2/2020 to 1/21/2021.
- During the pandemic, Maverick Gaming did not lay off a single teammate due to the pandemic and continued all employer contributions to health and other benefits for teammates.

Cost Inflation - Seattle Area CPI

- Maverick Gaming has been severely impacted by cost inflation, which has accelerated in 2021 with the Seattle Area Consumer Price Index (CPI) up 9.4% for all items (and 14.5% since June 2019), on top of general supply chain disruptions and intermittent delivery schedules of core inputs to the food and beverage businesses at our properties.
- While difficult to manage in any environment, the recent cost inflation has been particularly problematic as we rebuild from the closure period in the heart of the pandemic, and we do not want to further deter the return of customers by passing the cost of these increases on to them through higher prices.

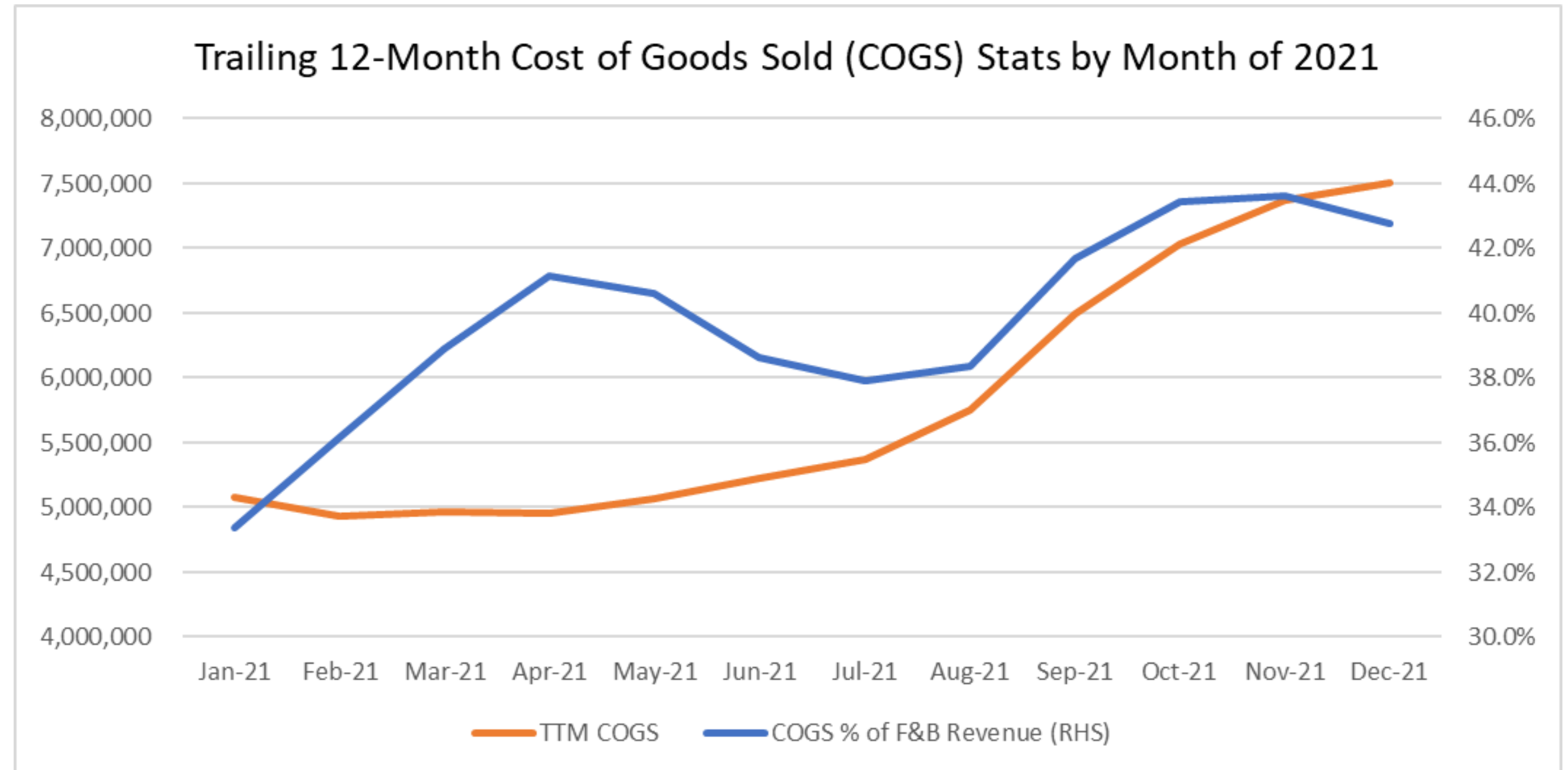

Maverick Washington COGS Inflation

- Maverick Gaming has experienced a severe increase in Cost of Goods Sold (COGS) at our Washington properties in 2021 in both nominal and % of food & beverage revenue terms.
- Trailing 12-Month COGS increased from \$5.0 million in January 2021 to over \$7.5 million in December 2021, while COGS as a percentage of food & beverage revenue (the primary revenue bucket associated with the variability of COGS) increased from below 34% in January 2021 to 43% in December 2021.
- Once a significant driver of revenue and employment at our properties, our food & beverage business is not sustainable on a standalone basis in the current cost inflation environment without the support of stronger gaming revenues.

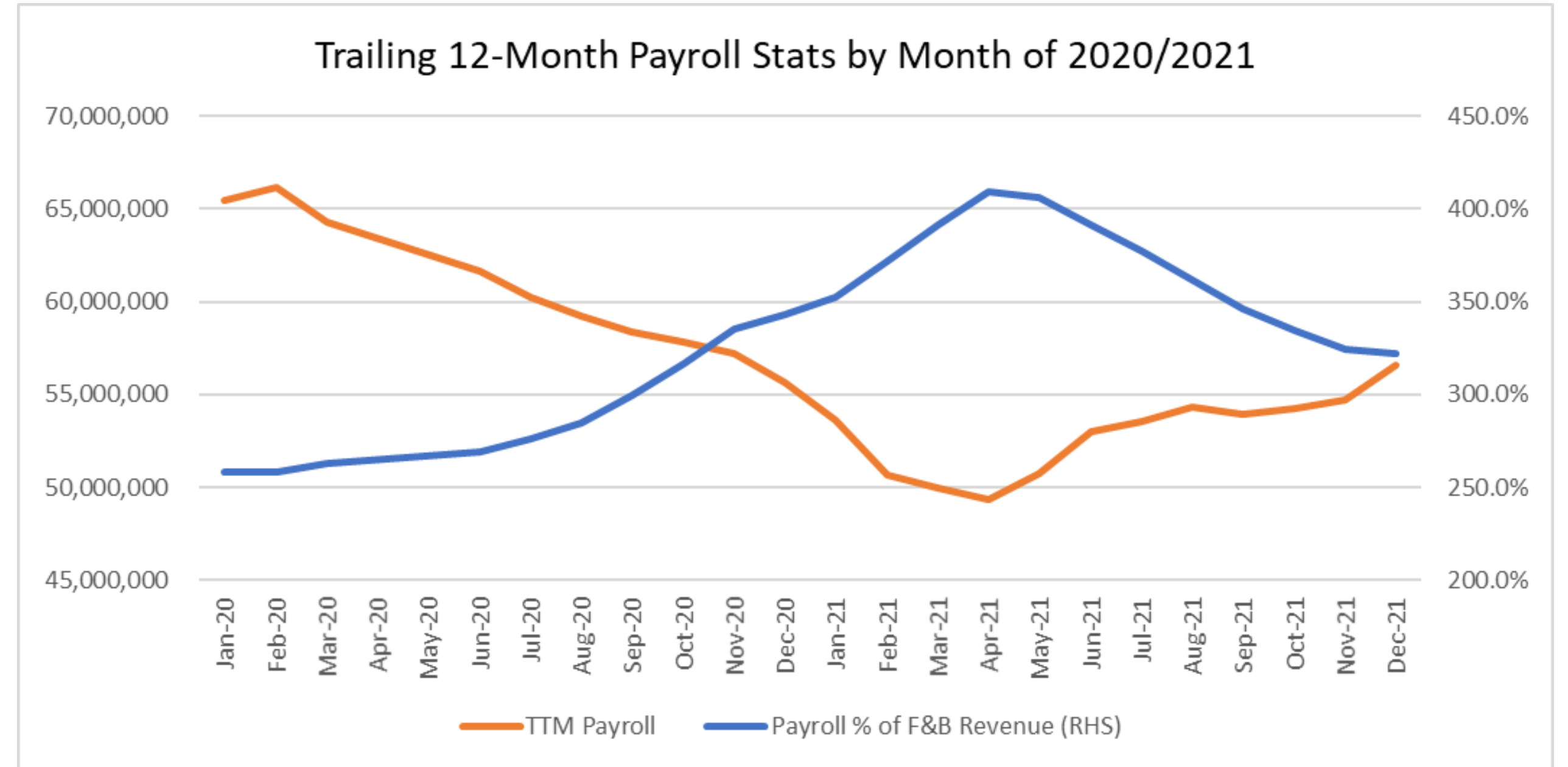

Maverick Washington Payroll Cost Inflation



- Looking at trailing 12-month payroll costs over the prior two-year period, Maverick Gaming was forced to reduce staffing levels at our Washington properties in 2020 due to the weak pandemic operating environment, but rebounded with significant hiring of well-paying jobs throughout 2021 as operations normalized.
- Payroll costs as a % of food & beverage revenue peaked in April 2021 at over 400% and have trended downwards to 325% in December 2021, but remain significantly elevated from the pre-pandemic periods of early 2020 with wage pressures from a tight labor market as well as our union responsibilities.

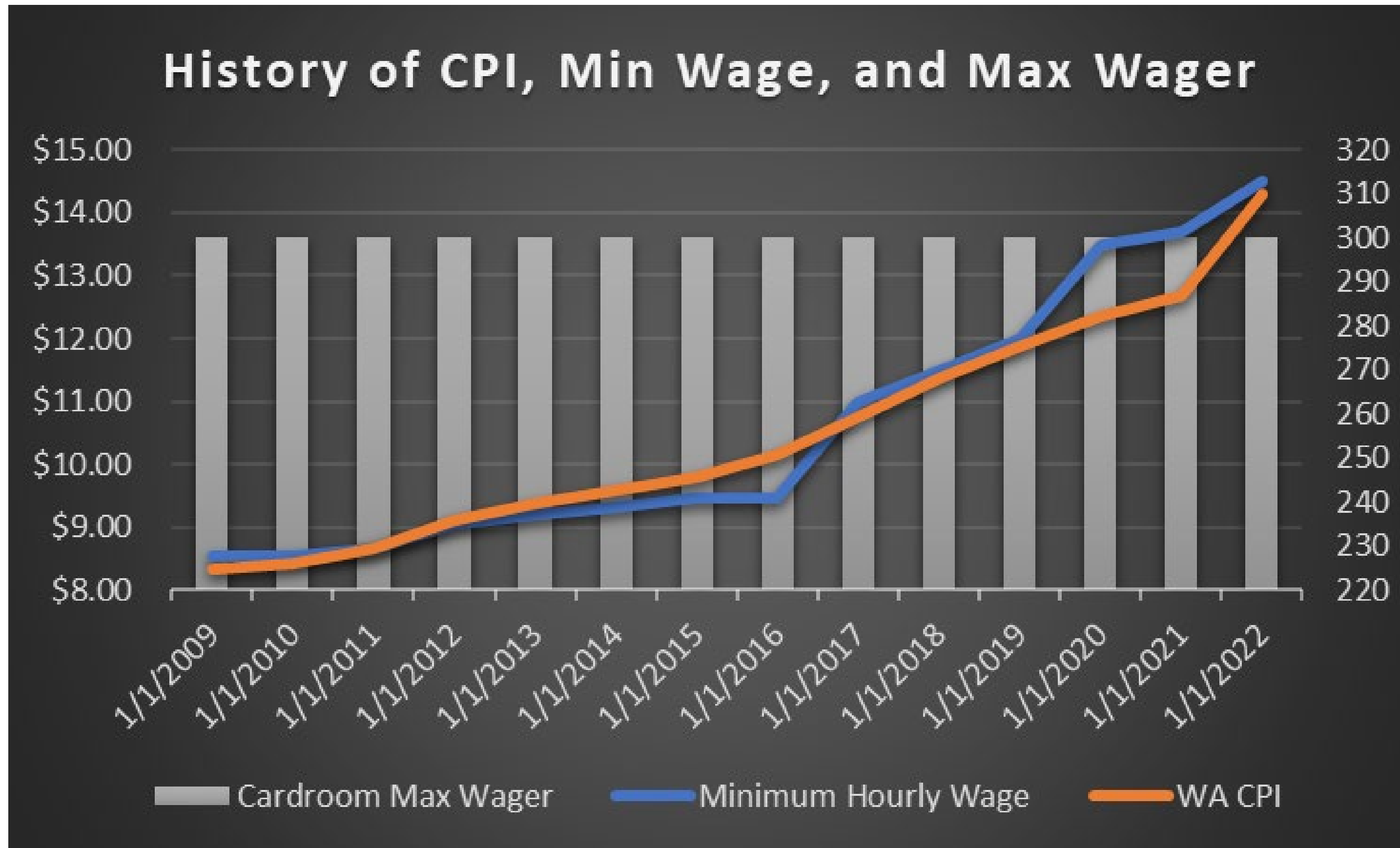

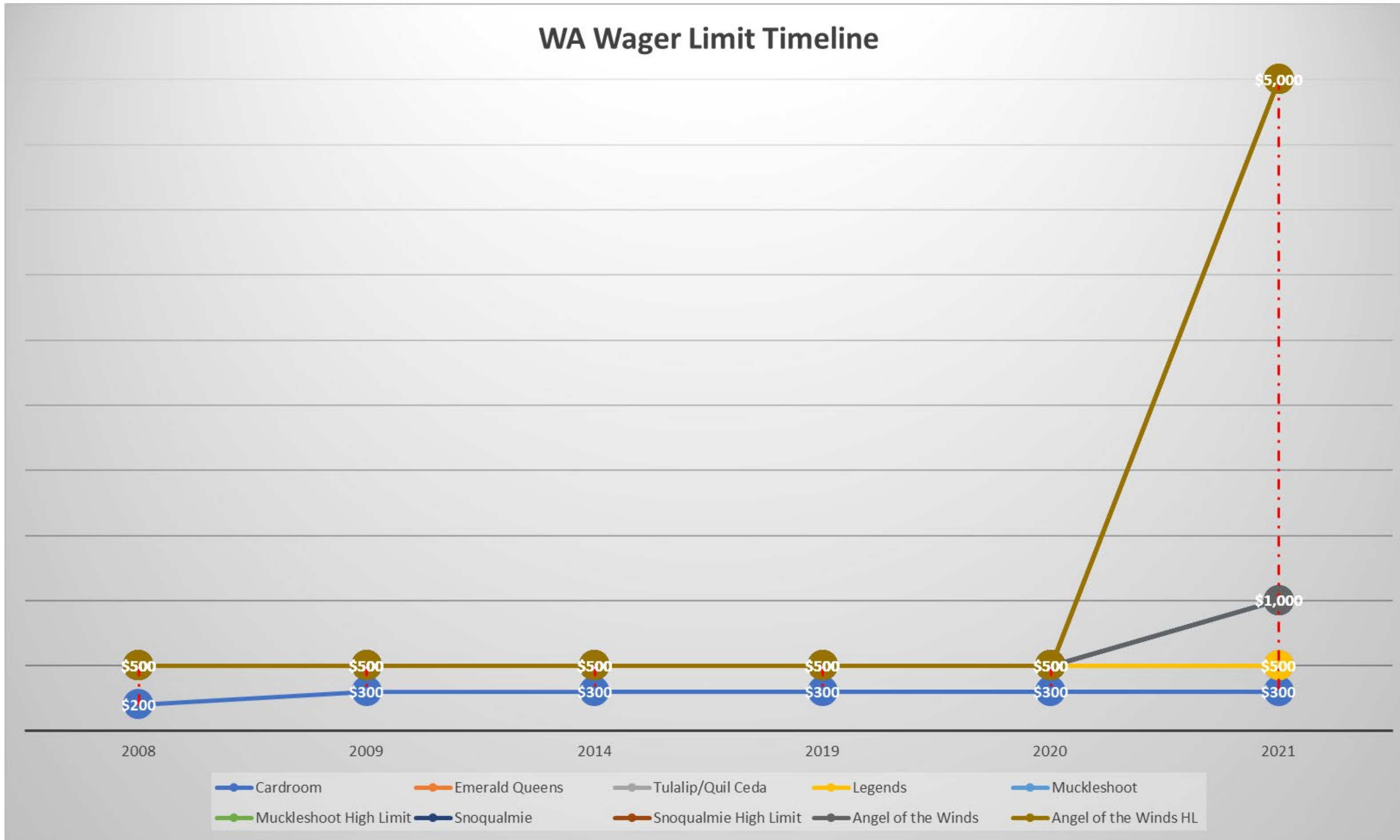

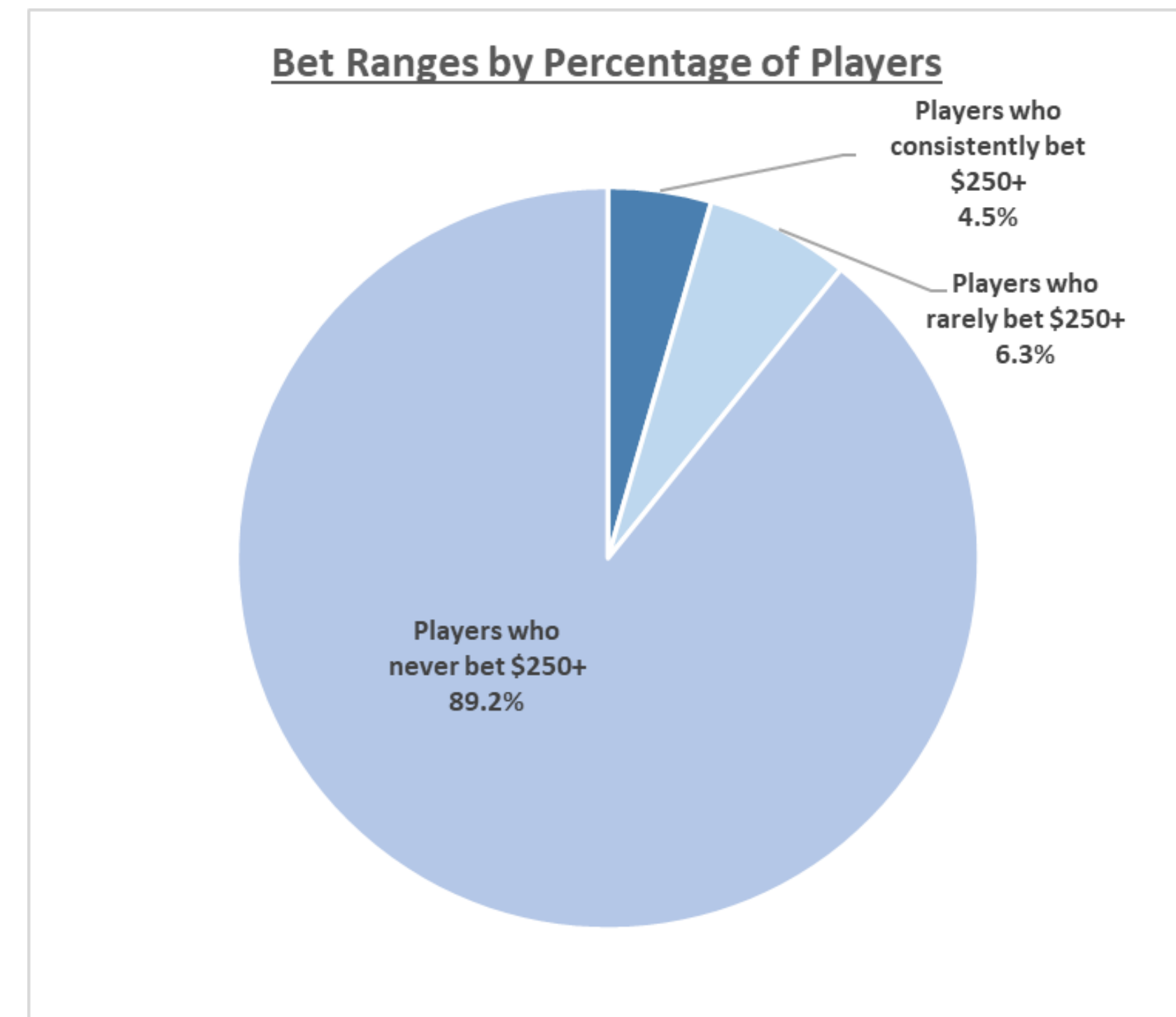
