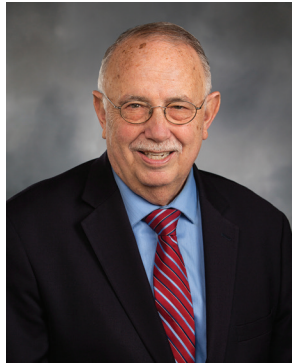

August Gambling Commission Meeting Minutes

Chair Levy called the virtual meeting to order at 9:33AM and mentioned that TVW would be livestreaming the meeting. Director Griffin called the roll to confirm a quorum.

There were 11 people in the audience and 56 people virtually.

Tab 1

Consent Agenda

Chair Levy asked commissioners if they had any changes to the consent agenda. They did not.

Public Comment:

Chair Levy asked for public comment. There was none.

Commissioner Sizemore moved to approve the consent agenda as presented by staff.

Commissioner Patterson seconded the motion.

The motion passed. 5:0

Director's Report

Director Griffin explained the restructure of the agency will occur once the deputy director and assistant director are hired. She stated that the Deputy Director's position was posted for recruitment on July 15th and closed August 8th. The agency received 29 applications. Interviews are schedule for the 15th and 16th, with second interviews occurring the following week. The Assistant Director recruitment will begin once the deputy director is on board. She also gave an accounting of the other leadership positions needed and the anticipated timelines of hiring. Lastly, she mentioned the new segment to the commission meeting lineup that is slated to begin in September called "Meet the WSGC staff". This segment of the meeting will be from 8:30-9:15

AM. Managers of operational and support units will be available to answer questions. Director Griffin invited Commissioners as well.

Tab 2

Presentation – Confederated Tribes and Bands of the Yakama Nation

The Honorable Virgil Lewis Sr., Vice Chair of the Yakama Nation, Tina Griffin; Director and Julie Lies, Tribal Liaison (TL) presented the materials for this tab. The Honorable Chairman Delano Saluskin was unable to attend so Vice Chair Virgil Lewis Sr. presented. The Honorable Virgil Lewis Sr. thanked the Commissioners and staff for their work and gave a brief history about the Yakama Nation. **TL Lies** provided a summary and a detailed account of the compact changes to the Tribe’s Amendment.

Commissioner Sizemore asked Vice Chair Lewis if he could describe who has benefited from their casino’s work. Vice Chair Lewis explained that they have provided \$1.9 million to buy supplies and fire trucks for the local fire department and \$1.7 million to local sheriff for the city of Toppenish Police Department.

Senator Conway thanked the Yakama Nation for a great presentation. He also asked if he could speak to the \$1.5 million in problem gambling contributions. **Vice Chair Lewis** stated, *“As a nation, we recognize problem gambling and always encourage a healthy and safe way of gambling. Our programs and services are put in place to assist problem gamblers. The goal of our program is to assist with reducing the negative impact problem gambling can have on our community. Tribal Gaming Agency has a self-exclusion regulation that ensures compliance at our facility. Our tribal gaming agents are trained on self-exclusion. They are trained to monitor, recognize signs of problem gambling, and process the self-exclusions. This year we have had 61 applications placed on self-exclusion. We have a total of 200 customers on the self-exclusion list. We had 220 customers on the self-exclusion list in '21. Yakama Nation problem gambling hosts public events annually to provide public awareness for responsible gaming. The program currently is servicing five clients and has an average between three and 10 clients, patients on annual basis. We provide services not only to the parents, but to the families as well”*.

Public Comment

Chair Levy asked for public comment.

Nanci Watson stated, *“My question was about the financial support for problem gambling. One thing we've been discussing in the problem gambling task force is that some tribes provide counseling and other services to people experiencing a problem with problem gambling, and they open it up to any citizen of the State of Washington. But we do understand that not every tribe is in a position to offer those types of services. What I was curious about is looking at the amount of money you're contributing, how much of that is available to pay for direct services to people who have a problem with gambling”?* **Vice Chair Lewis** reiterated that \$1.5 million dollars is available to problem gambling, and that the Yakama Nation authorized the full amount to problem gambling. He also said that the program is not strictly for the Yakama Nation members or tribes but is open to anyone. **Nanci Watson** followed up by asking if the funds were

administered through the behavioral health organization for the tribe. **Vice Chair Lewis** replied yes.

Vice Chair Patterson asked TL Lies to confirm the criteria for the high limit room regarding the amendment. **TL Lies** reiterated the criteria that would be looked at and explained that we have not worked out the specifics with the tribe until they are ready to offer the higher limits.

Vice Chair Patterson asked staff about how effective the tribe's pre-screening process is; prior to people being allowed in to play the high limit games and asked what the process looks like. She also asked staff to provide the commissioners with details associated with this topic in the future.

There was no further public comments.

Commissioner Patterson moved to forward the proposed compact amendment to the governor for review and final execution.

Commissioner Lawson seconded the motion.

The motion passed 7:0

Tab 3

Boys & Girls Club of the Columbia Basin

Brian Lane, Special Agent (SA), Kim Pope, Boys & Girls Club Executive Director (EA) and Deanne Klune, Raffle Chairperson presented the materials for this tab. **SA Lane** explained the process and stated that the Boys & Girls Club of Columbia Basin, located in Moses Lake, reached out to the Gambling Commission with questions regarding a fundraising idea involving a house raffle. They found a builder who would be willing to give them favorable terms on a house and they drafted their raffle proposal. The Boys & Girls Club of the Columbia Basin requests approval to offer a raffle prize in excess of \$40,000 and offer raffle prizes over \$300,000. They are estimating the house build costs to be \$250,000 with a FMV of \$400,000. **SA Lane** explained that the cost and estimated value may fluctuate between the time of the request and the date of the drawing in July of 2023. **SA Lane** introduced Executive Director (ED) Kim Pope to the commissioners. ED Pope thanked the commission and spoke about the program. She introduced Deanne Klune who is the House Raffle Committee Chair. Ms. Klune presented the proposal to the commission.

Chair Levy asked Commissioners if they had any questions.

Commissioner Reeves thanked all the presenters. She also asked Ms. Klune about the demographic population that the Boys & Girls Club of Moses Lake serves in the area. **Ms. Klune** referred to her presentation and said, "*We really want everyone to be aware of the children that we serve and the availability that we have to have more capacity if possible*". **Director Griffin** clarified for the record that the Boys & Girls Club are not seeking an enhanced raffle license as stated by Ms. Klune during her presentation, but rather a license to raffle a prize over \$40,000 and cumulative prizes over \$300,000 in their license year.

Chair Levy asked Commissioners if they had any questions. They had none.

Public Comment

Chair Levy asked for public comment. There were none.

Commissioner Sizemore moved to approve the Boys & Girls Club of the Columbia Basin to conduct a house raffle as presented by staff.

Commissioner Lawson seconded the motion.

The motion passed 5:0

Commissioners took a 10-minute break

After the break **Director Griffin** called the roll and verified there was a quorum of Commissioners.

Tab 4

Pull-Tab Inventory Control

Jess Lohse, Acting Rules Coordinator (ARC) and Taek Kim, Petitioner, presented the materials for this tab. **ARC Lohse** explained that Taek Kim, owner of Meeker St Bar & Grill in Kent, Washington is proposing to amend WAC 230-14-260 to no longer require licensed pull-tab operators to write the date they put a pull-tab series in play on the purchase invoice. The petitioner specifically wants to strike subsection (2) (b) of WAC 230-14-260.

The petitioner feels this change is needed because the requirement to write the date they place every pull-tab series in play on purchase invoices adds additional hardships for operators who do not use pull-tab point of sale/inventory systems. The petitioner noted that many operators already write the “date in play” information on the flare of the game or other separate tracking records after they place games in play. The petitioner feels that writing the date in play information also on the purchase invoices is duplication and not efficient. Mr. Kim thanked the commissioners and reiterated his concerns.

Staff recommends initiating rule-making proceedings for further discussion.

Chair Levy asked Commissioners if they had any questions.

Commissioner Sizemore asked Mr. Kim if he fully understood that should the Commissioners agree to rule-making and proceed for further discussion that the petition would then become the Commission’s petition. Mr. Kim understood.

Commissioner Reeves asked how many pull-tab licensees this rule change would affect.

Director Griffin replied, possibly 500 or more. She added not knowing exactly how many licensees have POS systems.

Public Comment

Chair Levy asked for public comment. There were none.

Commissioner Patterson moved to initiate rule-making proceedings as proposed for further discussion.

Commissioner Sizemore seconded the motion.

The motion passed. 5:0

Tab 5

Petition for Rule Change – Wager Limits for House-Banked Card Games

Jess Lohse, Action Rules Coordinator, Eric Persson, CEO, Maverick Gaming and Vicki Christophersen, representing Maverick Gaming presented the materials for this tab. **ARC Lohse** explained that the petitioner is proposing to amend WAC 230-15-140 by increasing the maximum single wagering limit from \$300 to \$500 for all house-banked gaming tables. Provided that if the licensee has a “high limit room” they may increase the single wagering limit to \$1,000 for a select number of high limit tables. The petitioner feels this change is needed to reflect current economic conditions and customer demand; and wagering limits have not been increased since 2009 and operating costs have increased significantly since then; and minimum wage has nearly doubled since 2009 and supply chain issues and inflation has had a negative impact on card room revenue; and to keep the wagering limits for card rooms fair and consistent with competitors, specifically Tribal casinos. Tribal compacts have been steadily amended to increase wagering limits at their casinos. The petitioner feels the effect of this rule change will allow house-banked card rooms to compete on a more level playing field with Tribal casinos. The petitioner also believes the rule change will allow for the preservation of family wage jobs and economic contributions to the communities they are part of. Lastly, the petitioner feels that the rule change will provide increased tax collection for the local jurisdictions they operate house-banked card rooms in. The petitioner's not looking to add more than 15 tables, rather as they noted in their petition, they're looking at increasing the wagering limits from \$300 to \$500 with the ability to go up to 1,000 for a select number of tables. House bank card rooms opened in 1997, where wagering limits for games were set at \$25. In 2000, wagering limits increased to \$100, and 2004 to \$200. And lastly, in 2009, the current limit of \$300. In 2016, the commission received a petition from the recreational gaming association, requesting the commission to increase wagering limits to \$500 that would match the limit of tribal gaming operations at the time. The commission accepted the petition for further discussion, but the RGA eventually withdrew their request after hearing some commissioner concerns. In January 2022, the commission received a petition from Tim Merrill with Maverick Gaming, requesting the commission to increase waging limits from \$300 to \$500 with the ability to raise it to \$1,000 on 25% of the tables, but the petition was withdrawn by Tim Merrill prior to the Commissioners taking any action. Staff feels that additional rule-making will be needed to address policy concerns, new definitions, and possible new requirements.

Vicki Christophersen and Eric Persson were delayed a few minutes. Chair Levy suggested hearing tab 6 before tab 5.

Commissioner Patterson asked Director Griffin if she or staff could remind her why Commissioners had concerns in 2016 over the then proposed wager limits. And possibly provide a more detailed summary of the discussion points prior to the petitioner withdrawing their petition in 2016. **Director Griffin** replied she would get back to her after re-reading the transcripts from that meeting.

Tab 6

Agency Request Legislation for 2023

Tommy Oakes, Interim Legislative Liaison (ILL) presented the materials for this tab. **ILL Oakes** presented an update on staff's work on agency request legislation. He explained that

promotional contest of chance would not be able to go forward because of the amount of work needed when short staffed. He also said that the proposed law enforcement bill is moving well and can be considered for agency request legislation.

Chair Levy asked Commissioners if they had any questions.

Commissioner Reeves asked if ILL Oakes had any insight on any potential legislation coming forward to give commissioners a heads up. **ILL Oakes** said potentially a couple rule petitions regarding licenses at two different locations. **Director Griffin** added, CJTC's potential expansion of campuses.

Senator Conway commented on the locations of the campuses. He hopes that CJTC takes into consideration Thurston-Pierce County area and Kitsap area as areas to expand their training centers.

Tab 5 continued

Petition for Rule Change – Wager Limits for House-Banked Card Games

At this time Chair Levy asked Petitioners from tab 5 if they were ready for their presentation. Vicki Christophersen and Eric Persson presented a PowerPoint outlining their petition.

Chair Levy asked Commissioners if they had any questions.

Commissioner Patterson asked the petitioner about the problem gambling task force, and that the current amount being invested is not adequate to meet the needs in order to treat people with addictions. She asked the petitioner if he would be cooperative if the state legislature asks for an increase of investment should that increase occur. **Eric Persson** agreed. **Representative Kloba** asked Mr. Persson about the names of his casino's and if they were foreign LLCs. **Mr. Persson** assured Representative Kloba that all 27 casinos are based in the United States. The parent company is located in Kirkland.

Commissioner Lawson asked the petitioner if the house-banked card rooms were allowed to keep food and beverage prices low by subsidizing it with the increased wager limits where everyone else that's also a restaurant that doesn't have the card room experience available in their restaurant is having to raise their prices anyway. And, she said card games are meant to be a commercial stimulant. But the information that she was seeing looked more like it is that the wager limit is not being asked of us to stimulate your food and beverage business. It's being asked to offset the costs or to subsidize your food and beverage business, which she doesn't think is the intent of the legislation RCW 9.46. **Ms. Christophersen** explained that 13 years ago the commission adjusted the rate based on economics of the business and we're back after 13 years again to ask the commission to adjust the rate again. **Mr. Persson stated, food and beverage prices, have increased over 20% year over year, subsidizing. That's one of the areas in our business where we're able to charge more for beer or charge more for the food that we get. What we need is more people in the building who then will buy food and buy alcohol and spend more time in our facility. And so, you can't just charge more to a gamer who comes to gamble because they get to choose the amount that they want to wage. And you also can't just arbitrarily change the rules, so you just take people's money faster. One, it would destroy the gaming experience, you'd probably lose your customers anyway. But two, you must have obviously a fair game for your consumer. So, by allowing a particular small segment of customers to bet more who want to**

bet more, we expect to see an overall lift corresponding to the seven and a half percent increase in our food and beverage as well throughout our home facility.

Senator Conway asked staff to look at the history of when and how wager limits were raised for house-banked card rooms.

Commissioner Reeves asked the petitioner to explain what he meant by inflation and raising the wager limit. Also, asked him about the tier one, tier two, and tier three supplier economic impact. She said, *"It seems to me like somewhere along the line, we shifted from really focusing on that restaurant retail, organizational base with a supplementary card room, or card activity, punch boards, whatever, to now actually having a full-blown gambling industry. So, kind of a second tier, if you will. And I would love for staff as we go through this rule making process to identify those establishments that really market themselves as card rooms first versus the establishments that market themselves as bars. And an example, I use, I have a small local establishment that I go into in Federal Way called Scoreboard. And it markets itself as a restaurant bar retail space. It does not necessarily publicly market, "Come here for punch boards, et cetera." But when you go into the establishment, you then find there are punch boards and other gambling activities that you can participate in. Whereas I think about places like the Silver Dollar or others where they're absolutely marketing themselves as a gambling establishment first, and then you go in and you can find out you can have Coke and Pepsi and all that good stuff. So, I guess I would really like to also use this rule making process to more distinctly where that division between restaurant and retail with a supplementary gambling activity versus a gambling activity with a supplementary restaurant in retail. Because I think that distinction needs to get made somewhere in this rulemaking process as a determination for how we're driving economic output and regulation around economic output in the conversation."* **Ms. Christophersen** answered the question by saying, *"I think we view this again as the beginning of a conversation and have provided some basic information around wage increases, inflation, cost of goods. So, all those things as part of the basis for asking the commission to move forward with this conversation. Everything you're talking about and the details that need to be explored further, that's exactly what we hope we can embark on with staff and with the commissioners and all stakeholders as we hopefully go forward with the rule making conversation. So, appreciate all those. I think they're good questions."* **Commissioner Sizemore** stated, *"In my mind, the rationale to initiate rule making is that the last time it was raised was 13 or 14 years ago. So that, in my mind, is probably adequate for us to take a look at the topic. I look at our legislative declaration that talks about limiting the nature and scope of gambling activities by strict regulation and control."* And he said, *"I am supportive of going ahead and initiating this rule making, but for me, to be convinced it's going to require fitting within our legislative declaration and for the legislature to essentially indicate that they're supportive that we're still within our statute. And I think that the legislature has done that to this point because they haven't passed a law or whatever to limit our ability to do this or consider a wager increase. So, I'm supportive. I definitely want to make my decision based on some other things that aren't here."* **Commissioner Sizemore** also stated that he wanted to have all the cardrooms weigh in not just the petitioner.

Chair Levy asked Commissioners if they had any additional questions. They did not.

Chair Levy asked for public comment.

Barry Murray, Liaison for the Iron Horse Casino, Auburn, Washington said, *“echoing what the points they made, whether it's costs, I think I mentioned to Director Griffin this morning that I can't hire a cook for less than \$22- \$23 an hour at this point. And it's becoming very challenging. Staffing's challenging everywhere, let's face it, but this is a nice step moving forward. And so, we just wanted to echo the support for this moving forward. Thank you.”*

Tony Johns on behalf of Evergreen Gaming said, *“I'm the general manager at both Chips and Palace Casinos in Lakewood. I just wanted to come to you and let you know that on behalf of Evergreen Gaming, we do support this rule change and really to echo what the representatives from Maverick are saying, with the increased costs of wages, the skyrocketing increases and inflation, really, it's become a challenge to kind of keep up with. Competitive wages is really what it comes down to from our perspective. We talk about competition, certainly when it comes to the tribal casinos from our perspective, when we talk about competing, we're talking about for similar jobs, similar positions. Floor supervisor wages, wages with cooks, security staff, surveillance staff, that's where we see the competitive end of things, where we have to compete to be able to offer higher wages or competitive wages to those staff members. And that's where a lot of our challenges fall. So really, that's our take on that. And certainly, we support the thought of bringing this petition forward for further discussion to really iron out the details and come to what everyone can agree is a workable solution to a lot of these problems that we face. And really, just dial in the details where everyone is comfortable with a wager increase, whatever that ends up looking like. And I thank you for your time.”*

Julie Anderson read the electronic public comments that were sent in to the Gambling Commission (insert date and time) from Tony Johns. “Evergreen gaming wishes to support the submitted rule petition requesting that the maximum wager limits be increased to \$500 and \$1,000 limited to no more than three table games. Evergreen gaming believes that this rule change is necessary to continue to keep up with the increasing wage growth and skyrocketing inflation. Evergreen gaming wishes to remain competitive with its pay and benefits offering throughout the food and entertainment industry the \$500 table limits will play a vital role in doing this and the \$1,000 limits, on up to three table games will allow us to provide a desirable option to the top 3% of guests who currently go out of state where comparable limits are offered. We thank you for your consideration of this rule change and look forward to participating in future discussions on how to implement it most effectively in a way that promotes safe and responsible gaming.”

Signed Tony Johns, General Manager, Chips Casino and Palace Casino.

Chair Levy called for public comment. There were no further public comments.

Commissioner Sizemore moved to initiate rule-making proceedings regarding wager limits for further discussion.

Commissioner Patterson seconded the motion.

The motion passed. 5:0

Lastly, **Commissioner Sizemore** mentioned going to the National Conference of Legislators of Gaming States (NCLGS) in Boston in July. He stated he found value in attending the conference and said that the organization is making great strides in having legislators from across the country, come together, be provided access to folks in the industry as well as to be discussing

some issues that are raising its head in gaming across the country, across Indian country, as well as the commercial and nonprofit area. Representative Kloba attended as well and was appointed to one of the executive committees for the organization. She said one of the motivations behind that is that she doesn't see enough attention in those meetings given to problem gambling. And she said it's often just a side note and it's inadequate. So, she really wants to take the work that we're doing here in Washington and bring it forward.

Thursday's meeting adjourned at 12:14 PM and will reconvene on Friday at 9:30 AM for Executive Session only.





Part II Licensing Investigations Summary





Staffing Update

Deputy Director

Gary has done an outstanding job serving as the Interim Assistant Director for the past 17 months. His 32 years of gaming, regulatory and progressive leadership experience will be of great value to our tribal partners, licensees, staff, and other stakeholders.

Gary began his career as a police officer for three years before joining the Gambling Commission in 1991. He spent the first few years in the Field Operations Unit in King County before moving to the Special Investigations Unit for seven years where he served as both an agent and supervisor. 2023 – 2028 Strategic Plan

to achieve agency goals.

New Sports Wagering Operations

Lummi Nation launched their sportsbook on August 25th. They are not offering mobile wagering at this time.

Nine Tribes are currently operating sports wagering with only one Tribe offering mobile sports wagering to select players on in their gaming facility.

Four Tribes are in the process of opening their sportsbook and/or offering mobile sports wagering.

Electronic Raffles

We recently issued temporary raffle licenses to the Seattle Seahawks Charitable Foundation and One Roof Foundation. Staff also completed field testing of the electronic raffle systems at Lumen field and Climate Pledge Arena. Both organizations are expected to begin offering electronic raffles at the upcoming September professional sporting events of the Seahawks and Kraken. A full report will be provided at the October commission meeting.

SUBMISSION PROPOSAL**

STATEMENT OF NEED

This request is tied to the Governor’s Priorities of Justice and Safety. In 2021, Engrossed Second Substitute Senate Bill 5051 (E2SSB 5051) was passed into law. It addressed a public policy concern by requiring all peace officers and corrections officers to obtain and maintain certification that could be denied, suspended, or revoked by the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission (WSCJTC) and adhere to set standards for hiring and training.

Limited authority Washington peace officers as defined in RCW 10.93.020, such as ours, are not required to be certified or trained by WSCJTC under E2SSB 5051. Due to the nature of our work, our limited authority Washington peace officers (“officers”) are armed, make arrests, and serve or assist in the service of search and arrest warrants.

While most limited authority Washington law enforcement agencies adhere to state training guidelines set forth for general authority agencies, limited authority Washington law enforcement agencies are not required to do so. This legislative proposal seeks to change that by having limited authority Washington peace officers, as defined in RCW 10.93.020 who, as a normal part of their duties, have powers of arrest and carry a firearm be certified and trained by WSCJTC to Washington state standards. This legislation would apply to officers of the Gambling Commission, Liquor and Cannabis Board, Office of Insurance Commissioner, Department of Natural Resources, and State Parks. All these agencies worked together to draft this bill.

This proposed legislation is not intended to expand the authority of these agencies but to align the training and certification standards that Washington leaders identified as a key component of police reform in 2021.

RELEVANT GOVERNOR’S PRIORITY ITEM

Justice & Safety

SUMMARY OF MAJOR PROVISIONS

This bill would amend certain sections of RCW 43.101 to allow limited authority peace officers of the Gambling Commission, Liquor and Cannabis Board, Office of Insurance Commissioner, Department of Natural Resources, and State Parks who, as part of their normal duties, have powers of arrest and carry a firearm be certified and trained by the WSCJTC. This bill also allows current officers working for these limited authority law enforcement agencies who were previously trained in law enforcement to be brought into the certification process without impacting the basic law enforcement academy (BLEA). This bill allows for the uniform training and certification of limited authority law enforcement officers to align with general authority officers without changing the authority of these officers.

CHANGES IN CURRENT LAW

Currently, there are no training requirements for limited authority law enforcement peace officers, nor are they certified by the WSCJTC. This bill would require WSCJTC to train and certify the limited authority law enforcement peace officers of the Gambling Commission, Liquor and Cannabis Board, Office of Insurance Commissioner, Department of Natural Resources, and State Parks.

STAKEHOLDER ANALYSIS

The Gambling Commission sent an email containing a letter and the draft bill language to fifty-eight stakeholder groups. This included representatives of each tribal government, owners of operating House Banked Card Rooms licensed by us, and law enforcement groups. WASPC is in support of this legislation. We did not receive any other stakeholder’s formal feedback.

Stakeholders and tribal partners were asked to provide feedback on this proposal by September 1, 2022.

This proposed legislation was originally presented to the agency’s Commissioners at the Gambling Commission’s May 2022, open public meeting with stakeholders and licensees in attendance. We held meetings with stakeholders and tribal partners to discuss this legislation in June of 2022.

EQUITY CONSIDERATION QUESTIONS

**Who is the target population or community that will benefit by the proposed legislation?
How will the population/community benefit?**

The target population is all residents of Washington. By having limited authority law enforcement officers of the Gambling Commission, Liquor and Cannabis Board, Office of Insurance Commissioner, Department of Natural Resources, and State Parks certified and trained by WSCJTC there will be accountability that is not currently present.

Describe how your agency conducted community outreach and engagement by relationally partnering with communities and populations who have historically been excluded and marginalized by governmental decisions.

This trailer bill to E2SSB 5051 is a culmination of feedback we have seen and heard from communities and populations who have historically been excluded and marginalized by governmental decisions. That feedback consistently showed the public's desire for all law enforcement officers to be certified and trained to one standard. This trailer bill will include limited authority law enforcement officers of the Gambling Commission, Liquor and Cannabis Board, Office of Insurance Commissioner, Department of Natural Resources, and State Parks in the certification and training process established in E2SSB 5051.

In addition to the original bill's outreach, we also contacted our tribal partners through meetings and with letters asking for their feedback, as well as meeting with WSCJTC staff and some of their commissioners to get feedback. We have worked with legislators that sponsored E2SSB 5051 throughout the writing of this bill to ensure that this bill meets the intent and feedback they received on the original bill.

This bill was built based on feedback received from E2SSB 5051.

This bill will allow the WSCJTC to regulate limited authority peace officers of the Gambling Commission, Liquor and Cannabis Board, Office of Insurance Commissioner, Department of Natural Resources, and State Parks the same way they regulate general authority law enforcement and correction officers. The consistency will benefit communities and populations who have been included and excluded and/or marginalized. The officers of the Gambling Commission, Liquor and Cannabis Board, Office of Insurance Commissioner, Department of Natural Resources, and State Parks will be held accountable to the people they serve.

13 (3) Remained current with the in-service 24-hour training
14 requirements as adopted by the commission by rule.

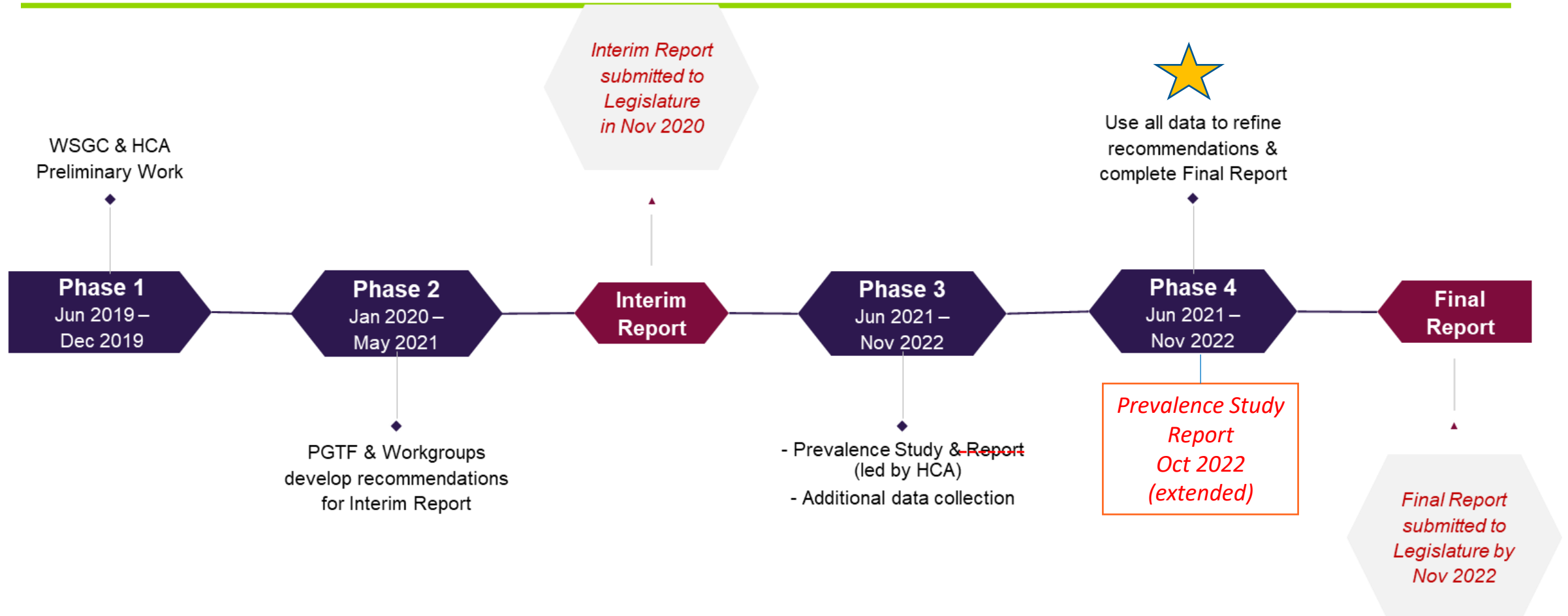

Adult PG Prevalence Survey

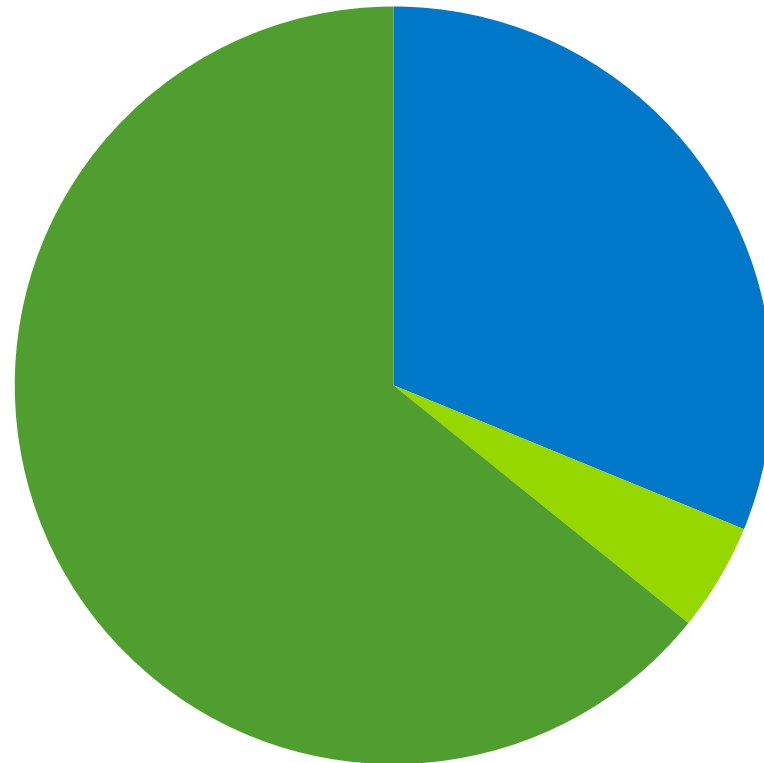

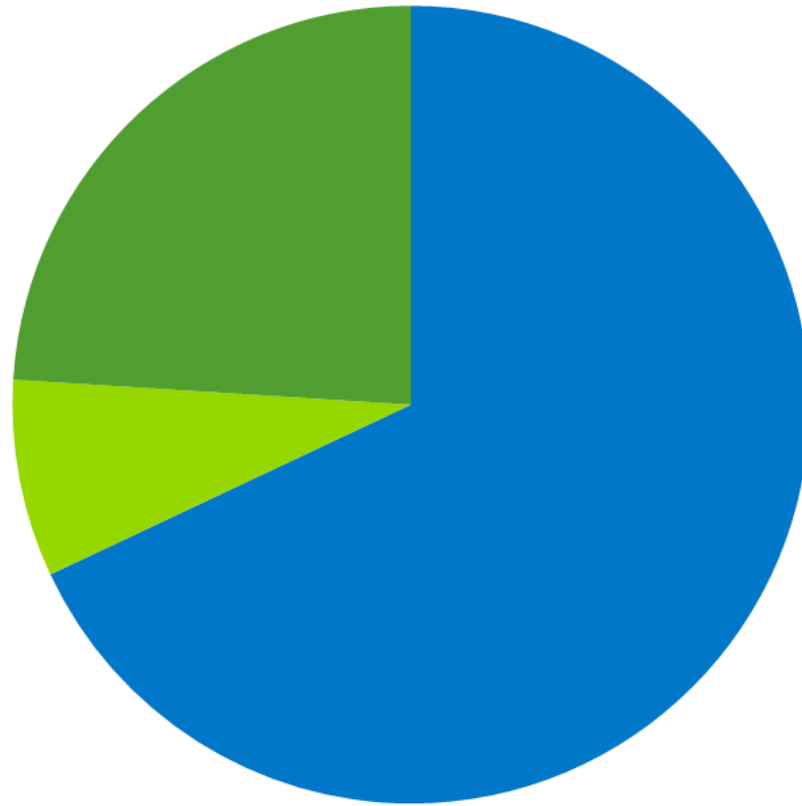
Availability of gambling (All Adults)

N=All respondents

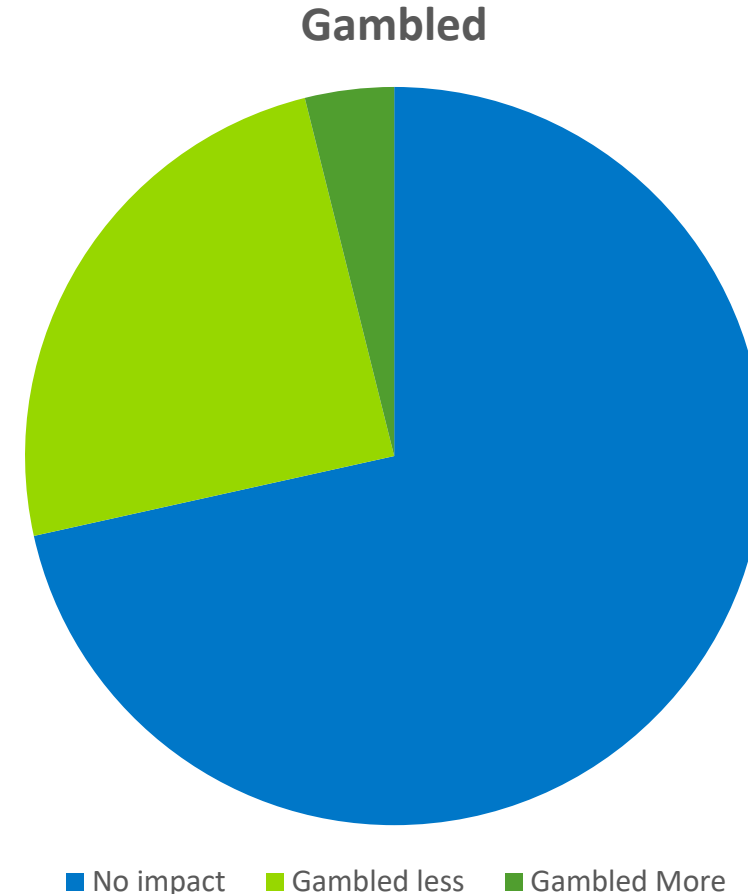
■ Harms outweigh ■ Benefits outweigh ■ About equal

Impact of COVID-19 pandemic on gambling (Adults who gambled in past 12 months)

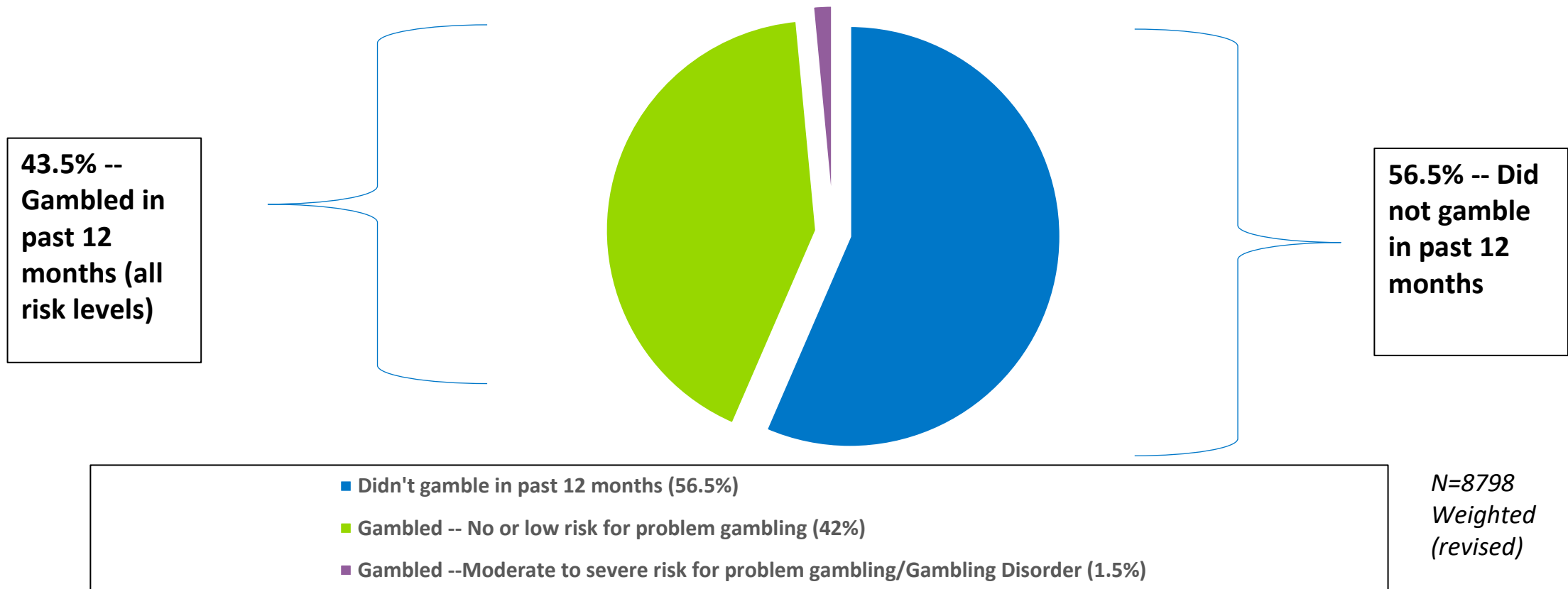

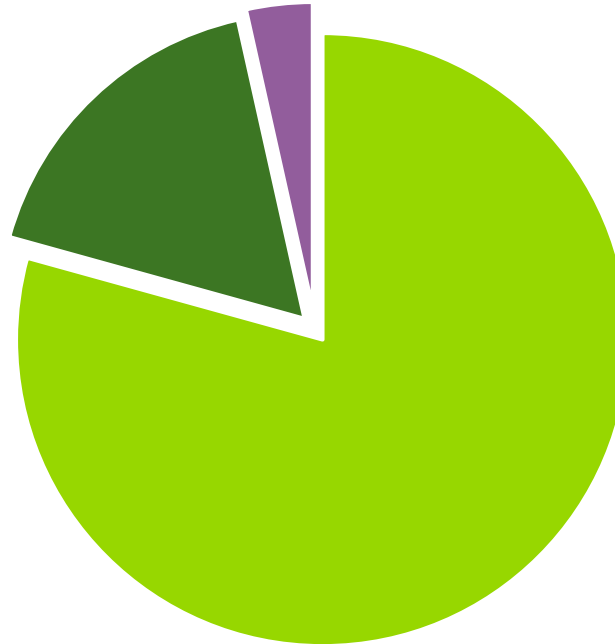

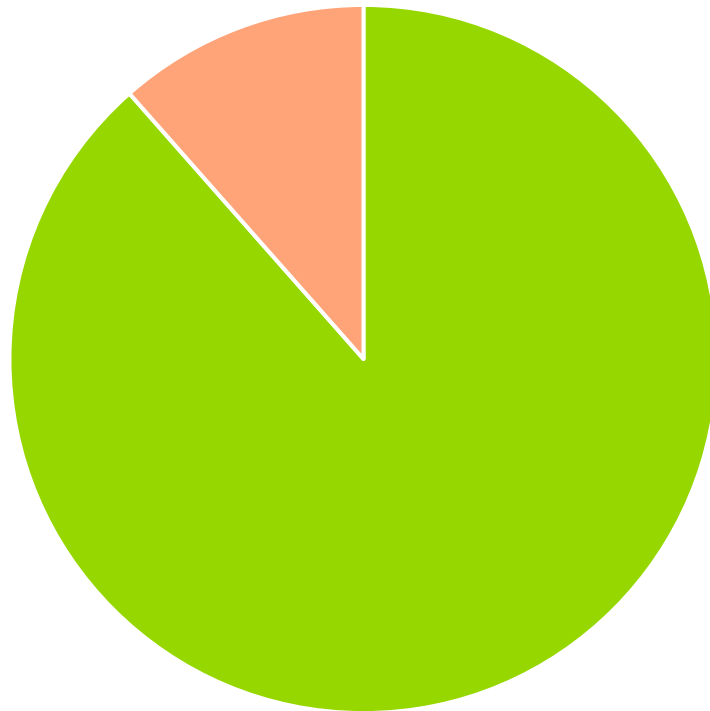

Legal Sports wagering -- considerations

▶ Specific consumer protections (examples)

- ▶ Time limits
- ▶ Deposit limits (daily, weekly, monthly)
- ▶ Win/Loss limits
- ▶ Give real time updates on how time & money is being spent/lost
- ▶ Clock always prominently displayed on screen
- ▶ Ability to self-exclude online
- ▶ ‘Cool off’ options
- ▶ Ability to unsubscribe to marketing (while still holding account)
- ▶ Operators should not be allowed to offer ‘credit lines’

Legal Sports wagering (continued)

- ▶ Ensure sports wagering is directly taxed based on a percentage of net revenue at a rate which sufficiently addresses the impacts
- ▶ Enact a Sports Bettor's Bill of Rights (similar to Virginia's)
- ▶ Include the 'gold standard' for statute language:
 - ▶ Funding for problem gambling services, to include prevention, treatment, recovery, education/outreach/awareness, clinical training, and research
- ▶ Advertising guidelines to minimize/ban around Youth & colleges
- ▶ Not use the term, 'risk-free'
- ▶ Require that the 1-800-GAMBLER national Helpline # be included (for ads)
