



RULES AND DEALING PROCEDURES

1. Casinos should set the ACE or iDeal shuffler to “Three Card Poker” or “Roll Your Own Blackjack.” This mode will dispense packs of three cards.
2. Players must make three equal bets—two blackjack bets and a Bonus bet.
3. The dealer, working from left to right, will give each player and himself a pack of three cards. When the dealer gets his pack, he should burn the top card and flip over the second card.
4. The dealer will then press the green button on the shuffler. This will dispense the remaining cards. The dealer will hold those cards in his hand and use them to deal the rest of the game.
5. After looking at their three cards, players must make a two-card blackjack hand and a one-card blackjack hand. Players indicate how they want to set their hands by turning the cards face-up in front of their blackjack bets.
6. The dealer, working in turn from his left to his right, first resolves the Bonus bet of each player. The Bonus bet wins if the player’s three cards are a flush or better.
Sample payouts:

AKQ suited	100 to 1
Straight flush	50 to 1
Three of a kind	30 to 1
Straight	5 to 1
Flush	3 to 1

7. The dealer then takes action on each player’s blackjack hands. Rules of play:
 - a. Players may double down on any two cards.
 - b. Players may split any two same-value cards.
 - c. Players may split up to four times.
 - d. Split Aces receive one card each; split Aces cannot be re-split.
 - e. Surrender is not allowed.
 - f. The dealer hits soft 17.
 - g. Player blackjacks always win and they pay 3 to 2. If the player and the dealer have blackjack, the player gets paid for his blackjack.

- h. A blackjack is defined as 21 in the first two cards. If a player plays a 10 or an Ace in his one-card hand, and the next card on that hand makes 21, it is a blackjack and pays 3 to 2.
 - i. Exception: If a player splits and makes 21, it is not blackjack.
 - i. Double blackjack: If a player's first three cards are Ace, Ace, 10-value, or Ace, 10-value, 10-value, he has a double blackjack. Both bets would automatically pay 3 to 2.
 - j. Insurance: If the dealer has an Ace up, players can insure for half the combined amount of their two blackjack wagers. Insurance pays 2 to 1 if the dealer has blackjack.
8. If the dealer runs out of cards before completing the round of play, all bets left in action win.
